GRANGER ASKS COOPERATION FOR DEFENSE

By OVID A. MARTIN WORCESTER, Mass., Nov. 13 (AP)—Louis L. Taber, master of the National Grange...

"The grange," he said, "challenges labor, business and finance to join with agriculture in unlimited production..."

Earlier, a message from President Roosevelt was read to the grange delegates, asserting it was the nation's supreme task to make the ideals of "a proper equality, equity and fairness" prevail through democratic action...

"We can do it. We must do it. We are doing it," the president said.

Mr. Roosevelt added that he had been a member of the grange for more than 25 years, and continued: "In the course of my membership I have often thought of the creed and purposes which members of the order adopted and announced at their national organization meeting in 1873 at Georgetown, D. C."

"We desire," said the founder, "a proper equality, equity and fairness; protection for the weak, restraint upon the strong. These are American ideals, the very essence of American independence."

"All of us subscribe," the president added, "to these ideals and principles. Our supreme task is to make them prevail through democratic action."

"I know that grange members, as well as all other American citizens, will continue to do their part to make and keep America strong and free and neighborly in a changing world."

STOCK MARKET HALTS RETREAT AT LOW POINT

NEW YORK, Nov. 13 (AP)—The stock market today inclined to call a halt on the lengthy retreat which had landed many leaders in new low ground for the year or longer.

Rallying signs appeared at the start, especially for steels and a number of "blue chips" which were under relatively severe pressure Wednesday.

Advances ranged from fractions to around 2 points for favorites in the forenoon with dealings fairly fast. Prices receded in many instances after mid-day and scattered heaviness here and there made for a somewhat irregular close.

Among moderately good share performers were US Steel, Southern Pacific, Great Northern, American Can, Westinghouse, Allied Chemical, J. C. Penney, U. S. Gypsum, General Foods, Montgomery Ward and Consolidated Aircraft.

American Telephone, Sears Roebuck and General Electric slipped to new 1941 bottoms. Leggards included Standard Oil (N. J.), Ex-Dividend; Dupont, United Aircraft, International Harvester, Cerro de Pasco and International Nickel.

WHEAT RALLIES ON BUYING BY MILLS

CHICAGO, Nov. 13 (AP)—Improved flour business, due partly to the recent decline of wheat prices, brought enough buying into the wheat pit today to rally the market but corn and soybeans continued to retreat.

Better harvest weather led to renewed selling that at one stage carried beans off as much as 4 cents a bushel and corn down a full cent. Later, however, there was a recovery as a result of short covering operations.

Wheat closed 1-1/2 cent higher than yesterday, December \$1.14 1/2 to \$1.14 3/4, May \$1.10 1/2; corn unchanged to 1c lower, December 75 1/2c, May 81 1/2c; oats 1-1/2c up; rye unchanged to 1c higher; soybeans 1-2c lower.
