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AAU Convention Splits On Presidential Issue

Di Benedetto Caucus Choice as New York Plumps for J. M. Roche

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 17 (AP)—After two days of beer and skittles, during which the convention program sailed along as merrily as you please, the amateur athletic union split wide open today on the candidacy of Lawrence Di Benedetto for his second full term as president.

The New Orleans proxy was the choice of the convention caucus to succeed himself and beating a caucus candidate in the past has been about as rare as buying a drink in this city on Sunday. Yet, the Metropolitan (New York district) association of the AAU opposed the choice so strongly it was prepared to nominate James M. Roche, a New Haven (Conn.) insurance man, for the job when the 400 delegates got together to elect officers at the final business meeting.

This row busted out during the annual convention banquet, after the conclave had gone through a long session disposing of such business as naming sites for next year's various national championship competitions—Dallas got the track and field plum—and approving more than 160 records for running, jumping, throwing, swimming and an assortment of other sports all the way to pitching horseshoes.

Although no one wanted to be quoted about the election business, it was learned the break-up was caused over control of the AAU.

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TREASURE SEARCH IN LAKE HASTENED

HAMER, Idaho, Nov. 17 (AP)—Searchers for a cache of legendary robbers' gold—undisturbed by scoters—hastened their excavation in the bottom of Mud lake today, expressing positive assurance they are near the treasure.

Manford Turman, one of four men seeking the gold bars said to have been abandoned 80 years ago by a fleeing highwayman, declared he had "a secret instrument" which definitely indicates the presence of gold, silver or platinum.

He dismissed as unfounded statements made by a long-time resident of this area that the robbers' loot had been found.

Meanwhile he and his companions continued their work of excavating a shaft 12-feet deep from the end of an elaborate pier which they have built into the lake.

The men were working under the water and have dug about six feet.

George Brunt, pioneer resident of nearby Idaho Falls, earlier this week said the bullion had been recovered by a man and a woman in 1910 or 1911 and that he, Brunt, had seen the hole in the ground from which the box of gold bars was taken.

To which Turman, Hamer postmaster, replied that according to his information the gold was not contained in a box, at all, but was wrapped in rawhide sacks.

"In my opinion if Mr. Brunt saw where a box had been removed," he said, "the persons who removed it actually dug up the casket of a Frenchman who was murdered and buried in about that location."

Circumstances of the legendary Frenchman's demise were not divulged by Turman or his associates, and Brunt and other old-timers—who have been busily recalling legends of many sorts since the Mud lake digging started—confessed the story was a new one to them.

The treasure, reported to have been worth \$40,000 to \$100,000, was said to have been sunk in the lake by a fleeing robber after he held up an early-day stagecoach carrying a shipment of the precious metal from rich western mines.

Santa Clara Drubs St. Mary's, 35-13

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 17 (AP)—Touchdowns in every period and a safety in the third gave Santa Clara university a 35-13 victory over St. Mary's yesterday and a measure of consolation for defeat in its three preceding games.

St. Mary's scored on a pass from Left Half Johnny Podesto to End Ray Curry shortly after the kickoff, but it was 7-7 by the time the quarter ended and 21-7 for the Broncos at the half.

St. Mary's left last night for New York to play Fordham next Saturday. Santa Clara, which had lost successively to Oklahoma, Stanford and Oregon, meets UCLA at Los Angeles the same day.

Hollingbery Says Cougars Bowl Team

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 17 (AP)—Washington State's Cougars, who ended their coast conference schedule with a brilliant 14 to 13 victory over Stanford, should be in the Rose Bowl New Year's day.

So said Coach Babe Hollingbery yesterday as he squired a jubilant Washington State football squad back to the Pullman, Wash., campus.

"They'd be a good bowl team. They're colorful and they can play sensational ball. In the last four weeks they've beaten Oregon State, Oregon, Idaho and Stanford," he said.

Oregon State currently is leading the conference, closely followed by Stanford and Washington. Against the Cougars' five wins are losses at the hands of Washington, Southern California and UCLA.

The Cougars have games remaining against Gonzaga and undefeated and untied Texas A&M.

"Sure we're going to win our next two games, but why not ask us who we intend to invite to the Rose Bowl?" Hollingbery inquired.

Asked that, he refused to talk further.

The enthusiastic Cougars appeared in good shape for their coming games. Fullback Bob Kennedy, who scored the second touchdown against Stanford, had a shiner, but the players said not one of them was seriously injured.

Fremont 'A' Wins Grade School Volleyball; Roosevelt Cops 'B'

Two thrilling games marked the finals of the annual city grade school volleyball tournaments held Saturday in the Fairview gymnasium. Roosevelt's "B" team walked off with the title in their league by winning the final contest from Mills "B" 15-11 and 15-12. Both games were well played and just as close all the way as the score indicates.

Fremont "A" turned back a determined challenge by the Riverside "A" to win the title in the senior division. Fremont won the first game of the match 15-8 only to have Riverside come back and take the second one 15-8. The downtown boys put on a drive to take the deciding third game 15-7. Both teams played the best ball of the season to prove their right to be in the finals.

Roosevelt "A" won third place in the tournament by defeating Mills "A" 15-6 and 15-6 in the consolation round. Roosevelt lost in the first round to Riverside "A." Mills was beaten by Roosevelt earlier in the tournament to go into the consolation. Fremont claimed third place in the junior tournament by virtue of winning a three-game match from Riverside "B" 6-15, 15-3, and 15-7.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 17 (AP) Rebuffed nine times in as many years, the University of Portland Pilots turned on the power yesterday to wallop the Gonzaga Bulldogs, 37 to 0.

Led by Halfback Louie Farnsworth, the Pilots pulled their way to three first-period touchdowns, then added a score in each succeeding quarter for their first victory since the teams first met in 1933.

Farnsworth tallied the first two touchdowns on runs of 16 and 31 yards and carried a lateral 24 yards for a third-period score. He also added the only extra point of the day on an end run.

Fullback Del Huntsinger bucked the line, and Charley Bicknell and Ed Scott caught laterals for Portland's other touchdowns.

Gonzaga's only threat was a 40-yard march halted on the Portland 22-yard line in the last period.
