Plenty of Turkeys On Hand But Price Reported Higher

for just the one meal. Most fun of Thanksgiving to many is "picking" the turkey for a cold snack on Thursday night. Turkeys appear to average from one to one and a half pounds more in weight than last year. The price, as stated before, 33 cents for hens, 29 for toms.

Potatoes of course are good. Klamath netted gems, and the gray comes out of the turkey unless you want a cupful of small pearl onions, boiled until tender, and added at the last minute. Very good, and very pretty, too, in the gravy.

Cranberries, Oregon grown, are selling at two pounds for 25 cents, this price practically the same as last year's crop. Up until a few days ago cranberries brought 15 cents a pound. The drop is appreciated. Canned cranberry jelly is fairly reasonable, 15 cents a can. But there are two schools of thought there, too. Some housewives look with horror on the users of canned cranberry sauce—but some moderns think it's a waste of time to spend an hour sieving and moulding when with a simple twist of the wrist—!

Going back to potatoes, few would consider a Thanksgiving dinner without candied yams. Little Joe yams, choicest of all, will be fairly cheap this year. The little Joes from Louisiana are expected to drop from the early week price of four pounds for a quarter to something like three pounds for 10 cents.

Brussels sprouts are good and fairly cheap, but not so cheap as last year when they went two pounds for 19 cents. They're good with just plain butter, salt and pepper and some like a dash of mild vinegar or lemon juice.

Not too heavy a salad, plans the wise housewife. Most satisfactory is a plate of chilled carrot strips, green onions, stuffed celery or just plain salted celery, radishes or cold artichoke hearts with Russian dressing.

Now for dessert if you can find room above the collar bone! Pumpkin pie goes right along with turkey like an organ in a church. A funny thing, but those who won't stoop to a can of cranberry jelly, wouldn't waste time sieving pumpkin to get the pulp for pie. Trick so you can make it the day before, coat the unbaked pie shell with the white of an egg and let it stand a while. Makes a film which prevents that undesirable soaking. Some will offer steamed pudding with hard sauce. We don't know anything about this and never, at this stage of the game, were able to handle a serving with anything but a pop-eyed groan. But good puddings come in cans. Just steam and open.

A nice touch is black coffee, crisp crackers and a spot of cheese. No more imported cheese, as mentioned above, but a nice serving of Wisconsin "sharp" at 50 cents a pound, or domestic Roquefort which comes from Langlois at 85 cents, even the domestic Provoletti, something like the old imported Italian parmicelli, is good at 55 cents a pound. Provoletti also comes from Wisconsin and very fine. Cheese is up considerably and domestic Roquefort last year could be had for something around 60 cents. Now it's 85.

The trimmings will be slightly higher, such as butter which now brings 44 to 45 cents, and was something like 10 cents under that figure last year. But the housewife will go about her shopping, and she'll do a good job of it for the markets are plentiful. She'll pay a lot more for this and that, but when it comes right down to it she'll pay it and like it, and thank the powers that be that she can buy Oregon cranberries, Louisiana yams, Klamath turkeys, and Langlois cheese, and know that it isn't "ersatz," but right good victuals!

KURUSU TALKS WITH HULL ON ORIENT CRISIS

and Navy Minister Shigetaro Shimada declared to the same session that Japan's army and navy were fully ready for any eventuality, but these statements replied to questions concerning relations with Russia rather than the United States.

The foreign minister, replying to a questioner, said the outcome of the talks which Kurusu began in Washington yesterday with President Roosevelt and Secretary Hull "is unpredictable." "It is still too early," he went on, "to state what effect the outcome will have on the third clause of the tripartite pact"—the clause which obligates each signatory to lend all aid, including military, to its allies if they are "attacked" by a power not yet involved in the European or China wars.

The foreign minister said Kurusu had been sent to Washington only for the purpose of assisting Ambassador Admiral Kichisaburo Nomura and carried no new instructions. He intimated that Japan's fundamental position had not changed since the opening of the current Washington talks seven months ago.

The ministerial declarations followed a meeting of the cabinet in the parliament building which the newspaper Asahi said was highly important and concerned the Kurusu mission. Presumably the ministers considered Kurusu's reports of his first meetings yesterday with President Roosevelt and Hull.

Civil War in Yugoslavia Seen Nearing

negro, villages have been bombed and burned where antagonistic Montenegrins have resisted the occupying forces.

An spokesman in London for the Yugoslav government-in-exile declared last week that, despite mass executions of 350,000 Yugoslavs, relentless mountain warfare waged by 80,000 guerrillas had wrested most of Serbia from the axis.

Macedonia, absorbed by Bulgaria after the Balkan campaign, virtually is sealed up as a news source, but there have been reports of outbreaks there, too. Field Marshal Milan Nedlic, the Serb premier, himself has appealed for a halt to the fighting, warning recently that full-fledged civil war was developing.

He named seven towns which already had been laid in ashes as a result of the fighting. Advances received here since then have reported at least 150 rebels or "communists" killed and innumerable others wounded battling government forces.

Most of the clashes apparently are centered in an area within a radius of 75 miles south and southeast of Belgrade and in the province of Macva west of the Serb capital.

Terrorists are pictured as so active that Serbian railways are almost unusable except for main lines kept open under strong military guard.

German Ace Dies in Testing 'Secret Weapon'

BERLIN, Nov. 18 (AP)—Col. Gen. Ernst Udet, German flying ace of the World war, was killed in an accident yesterday while testing "a new weapon," it was announced today.

The official announcement said Udet was hurt so gravely that he died before he reached a hospital.

Udet was 45 years old. Adolf Hitler, who had named German pursuit Squadron No. 3 for him in recognition of his achievements, ordered a state funeral in his honor. The time and place have not yet been decided.

Udet visited the United States in 1931 to participate in national air races in Cleveland. While there he met Walter B. Wanamaker, of Columbus, O., whom he had pulled out of the wreckage of an American plane he shot down in 1918.

government acted, any open or closed shop status would be frozen.

President Roosevelt held a conference with labor and management representatives in an effort to avert a threatened strike by railway workers but it broke up with declarations no conclusions had been reached. Another meeting with the president was set for tomorrow.

The railway workers demand wage increases of 30 per cent. Railroads have agreed to give some 13 1/2 per cent increases and others 7 per cent. The strike is set for December 7.

SERVICE CLUBBERS IN JOINT SESSION

With good fellowship the keynote, members of the Kiwanis and Lions clubs met jointly Tuesday noon at the Willard hotel. Kiwanians were invited by the Lions to the joint session because Kiwanis regular meeting day is Thursday, Thanksgiving day.

President Clarence Humble of the Lions club turned the meeting over to President Fred Southwell of Kiwanis, who in turn introduced Willard Ward, chairman of the day. The Kiwanis club staged the program.

It included numbers by a male octet led by Kiwanian John Houston, a sleight of hand performance by Kiwanian Charles Seavey, an inspirational talk by Kiwanian L. K. Johnson, and the singing of a special number, "Wandering Wind," composed by Marie Obenchain of Klamath Falls. Mrs. Rollin Cantrall sang the number, accompanied by Miss Obenchain, and the two clubs then sang it together.

Earlier President Roosevelt called upon the CIO today to cooperate in the production of arms "without delay and without interruption."

In a message to the CIO's annual convention, the chief executive said:

"We need guns, tanks, planes and ships and we must produce them without delay and without interruption, and the American people and their government are determined that we shall have them."

The IWA has claimed that a

majority of employees at both the Lamm Lumber company mill at Modoc Point and the Long-Bell Lumber company in the city are members of the CIO unit.

It was believed that hearings would be set on the petitions in the near future—usual NLRB procedure in such cases.

George Brown, chief IWA representative in the basin, also disclosed that the union has recently completed a collective bargaining contract with the Lamm Lumber company covering hours, working conditions and seniority provisions for over 200 woods employees. The signing culminates long-drawn out negotiations during which there were several rumors of an impending strike at the woods operation.

Brown described the contract as a "good sound, substantial agreement."

The groups met for the first time in the firm's offices Monday for what was expected to be at least a two-day conference. Presiding over the conference was Federal Conciliator E. P. Marsh of Seattle.

Long-Bell employees have been out on strike for four weeks, completely closing down the big Weed plant. They are seeking higher wages and a union shop.

On Tuesday night at Legion hall, the picture, "Army on Wheels," was to be shown to all members and auxiliary members. Both groups were asked to be present.

Murmansk and Archangel are the shortest route for getting American supplies into Russia and it may be taken for granted that Germany will do everything she can to close it.

That is one reason for the long and stubborn defense of Leningrad.

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WINTER WEATHER HALTS 2 PLANTS

Oncoming winter and resultant poor logging conditions have caused the closing of two of the smaller mills in the Klamath area, it was revealed Tuesday by Jack Almeter of the Oregon State Employment service.

The Peterson-Johnson Lumber company has shut down both its woods operation and sawmill for the season as has the Ellingson Lumber company on the Ashland highway at the Klamath river, he said.

It was thought the shutdown would last for the entire winter.
