KUHS EDUCATORS MEET IN ASHLAND

Klamath Union high school teachers were attending the regular semi-annual Teachers' Institute Monday in Ashland, a meeting which ends Wednesday night.

One of the main addresses of the three-day session was to be given by Arnold Gralapp, superintendent of KUHS, who was to speak to instructors of vocational education classes on "Industrial Arts and Vocational Defense Classes." Monday, Clem Clarke, state supervisor for the State Board for Vocational Education, was to preside.

Gralapp will preside over a general assembly Wednesday morning. Governor Charles A. Sprague will address the group of southern Oregon educators Tuesday morning.

Frank Jenkins, Klamath publisher, will participate in a forum on "America's Defense Program" Tuesday afternoon. There will be no school for KUHS students until next Monday, November 24.

Lakeview Highway Contract Awarded

PORTLAND, Nov. 18 (P) — The state highway commission approved hiring yesterday of a part-time employee to coordinate old Oregon trail centennial celebrations in 1943.

The commission also awarded contracts including: Lake county — Drews valley rock production for Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway, Rogers Construction Co., Dayton, Wash., \$13,842.

Referred to engineer with power to award was: Lane — Construction 1.87 miles on Eugene-Judkins point section of Pacific highway, Strong & McDonald, Tacoma, \$205,515.

To Speed Defense Traffic



LONG TURNTABLES INSTALLED BY SP

As part of Southern Pacific's far-reaching program to speed defense traffic, the railroad is spending nearly \$300,000 in enlarging engine house turntables at San Francisco, Los Angeles, Tracy, Eugene and Tucson.

The longer tables, capable of more rapid handling of longer engines and tenders, will materially cut the time necessary to move locomotives into and out of engine houses.

Picture shows workmen replacing the old 80-foot turntable at the Bayshore engine house in San Francisco with one 110 feet long. The new girder-type table is being moved by cranes along the old deck-type table before removal of the latter. The new table was then set to one side on the cribbing visible at right, the old table pulled out of the pit, and the new one placed in position. The entire job was completed in less than eight hours, with little delay to operations.

Total Tax Levy For Half 1942 Shows Increase

Total to be raised by taxation in the first half of 1942 for state and county purposes, schools and city functions in Klamath county is \$975,962.74, as compared with \$910,079.41 in half of 1941, it was stated Tuesday by County Assessor Charles H. Mack.
