

PROCLAMATION OF PRESIDENT ASKS PRAYERS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (AP)—President Roosevelt asked the American people to observe Thanksgiving with "prayers for a speedy end to strife and the establishment on earth of freedom, brotherhood and justice for enduring time," in a proclamation setting November 20 as the date of the observance.

The text of the proclamation follows:

"I, Franklin D. Roosevelt, president of the United States of America, do hereby designate and set aside Thursday, the twentieth day of November, 1941, as a day to be observed in giving thanks to the heavenly source of our earthly blessings.

"Our beloved country is free and strong, our moral and physical defenses against the forces of threatened aggression are mounting daily in magnitude and effectiveness.

"In the interest of our own future, we are sending succor at increasing pace to those peoples abroad who are bravely defending their homes and their precious liberties against annihilation.

"We have not lost our faith in the spiritual dignity of man, our proud belief in the right of all people to live out their lives in freedom and with equal treatment. The love of democracy still burns brightly in our hearts.

"We are grateful to the father of us all for the innumerable daily manifestations of His beneficent mercy in affairs both public and private, for the bounties of the harvest, for opportunities to labor and to serve, and for the continuance of those homely joys and satisfactions which enrich our lives.

"Let us ask the divine blessing on our decision and determination to protect our way of life against the forces of evil and slavery which seek in these days to encompass us.

"On the day appointed for this purpose, let us reflect at our homes or places of worship on the goodness of God and, in giving thanks, let us pray for a speedy end to strife and the establishment on earth of freedom, brotherhood, and justice for enduring time."

The 16 states which will observe Thanksgiving on the last Thursday—this year November 27—are Arkansas, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Iowa, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, and Vermont.

Mrs. Clarence Tracey is now working in the water office in Lakeview.

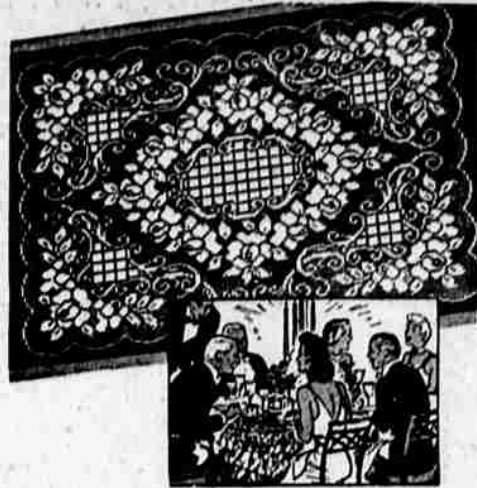

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THANKSGIVING FOOD TO COST NATION PLENTY

CHICAGO, Nov. 19 (AP)—The traditional Thanksgiving feast, of deepest significance this year, will cost Americans more than at any festivity in the past decade, food price statistics indicated today.

Measured in the cost of the various food items, market experts estimated probably 16 per cent more cash must be laid on the counter to get the same basketful which, a year ago, came at a bargain.

There's hardly an item that's not more expensive, except possibly a few vegetables and "trimmings." Cranberries are priced about the same as a year ago in the Chicago wholesale market. Some poultry are only slightly higher, particularly ducks and geese which, wholesale dressed, are up 6 to 7 per cent.

Turkeys were up about 20 per cent. Some spices are sharply higher and relatively scarce. Trade analysis indicated that in general retail prices have lagged behind the advance in wholesale markets. In instances, while some foods are costing dealers more than a year ago, figures posted at counters, are little, if any higher.

The bureau of labor statistics November 8 index of wholesale

food prices for the country as a whole was 23.8 per cent higher than a year ago. Important items which were higher in the Chicago wholesale market today included butter, up about 12 per cent, eggs, up 60 per cent, lard 100 per cent, flour 20 per cent and cheese 45 per cent.

The bureau's index for retail food costs just a month ago was only 16 per cent higher than a year earlier but the highest since January, 1931.

TEACHER SALARY BOOST FAVORED

ASHLAND, Nov. 19 (AP)—Governor Sprague approved teachers' efforts to obtain higher salaries in a talk here Tuesday. He told teachers from four southern Oregon counties attending an institute on the Southern Oregon College of Education campus that low salaries lessen the attractiveness of the teaching profession and result in fewer students attending education colleges.

Three major objectives for Oregon schools were listed by him as more consolidation, longer school terms and equalization of taxes with increase in state support.

The governor said Oregon was 34th among the states in number of school days annually.

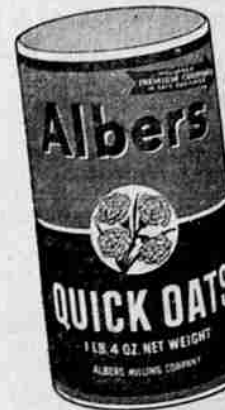
Flying Warden Spots Violation

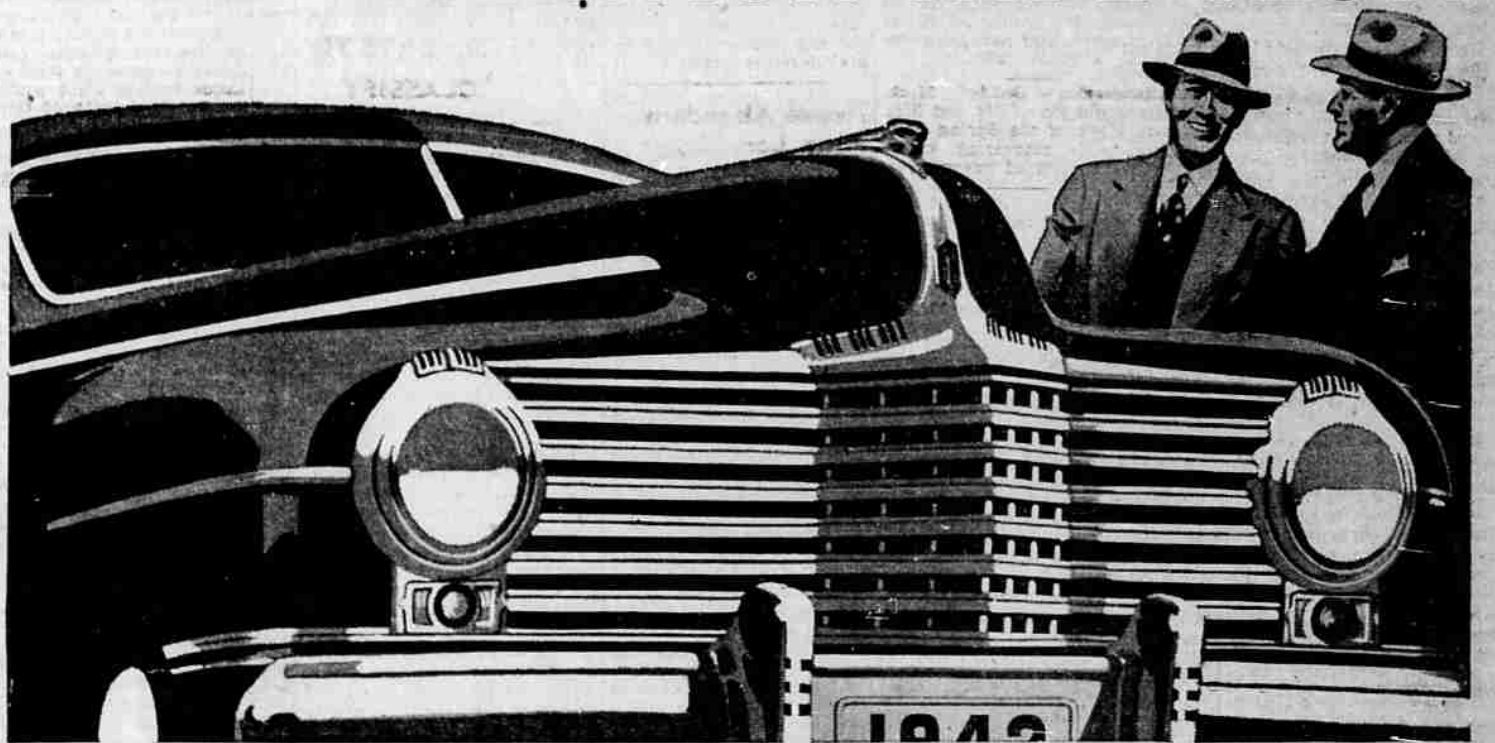
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
