Gasoline output in 1939 was over 24 billion gallons and a single train to carry it would be over 14,000 miles long, according to the census bureau.

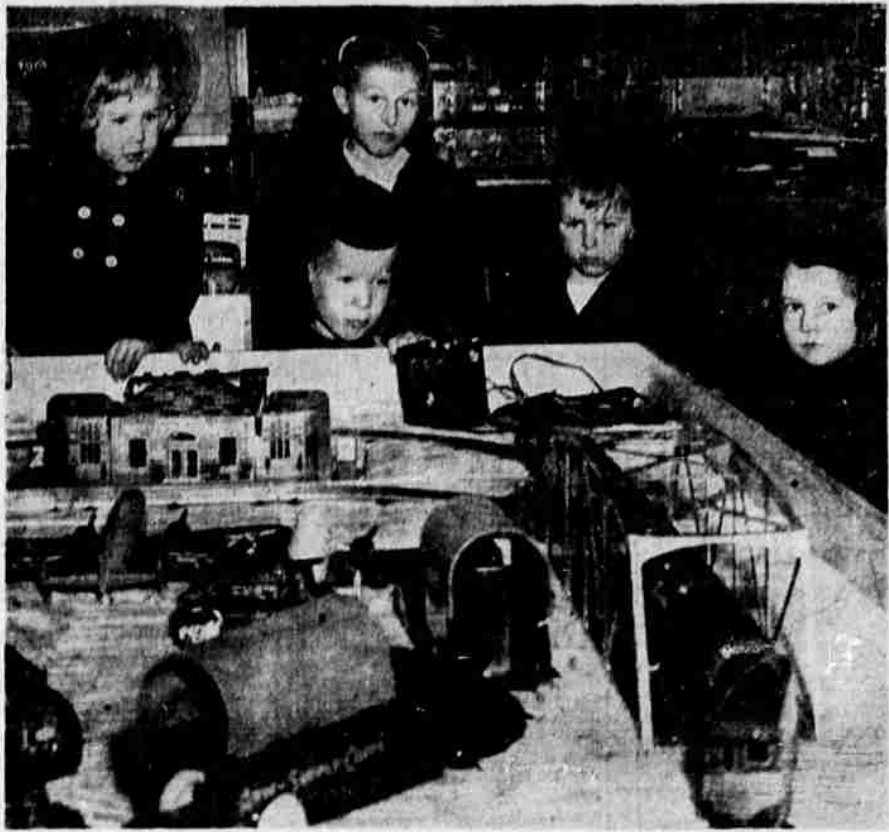
There was an increase noted in the 1940 census reports in the vitamin-bearing crops—tomatoes, oranges, and lemons.
