

LITVINOFF MIFFED AT PLANE TAKEOFF

TEHERAN, Iran, Nov. 20 (AP)—Cold-shouldered by minor British officials who barred him from passage to Cairo on a British overseas airway transport Wednesday, Maxim Litvinoff, Russian ambassador to the United States, and his wife prepared to take a Russian plane today.

Although the British minister to Iran profusely apologized for the action of the plane in leaving the Russian diplomat on the airport, Litvinoff called it an insult.

He appeared to have recovered his temper in the afternoon, however, as he boarded the green-camouflaged, machine-gun-turreted Soviet plane which had brought him from Kuibyshev. The plane was unable to take off, however, when a 30-mile dust storm limited visibility. Litvinoff and his wife conferred with the pilot and it was decided to try to reach Cairo today.

Earlier they had been refused seats on the British plane. The British minister, Sir Reader William Bullard, came to the field to see Litvinoff off and showed embarrassment when Litvinoff remarked:

"All would have been much simpler if I had been told yesterday no seats were left in the British plane."

Bullard replied that it was urgent that the British legation counselor, J. D. Greenway, one of the passengers, leave for India, and said other unexpected factors had resulted in a misunderstanding.

Mrs. Ivy Litvinoff, a motherly-faced Englishwoman whose hair is as snowy as her husband's, asked:

"Are we going, papa?" Bullard informed Litvinoff he had radioed to Cairo asking that the Soviet plane be accorded every facility.

Reluctantly, the Litvinoffs drove back to town, leaving their luggage aboard the Soviet plane. A bearded Armenian bishop, en route to a Middle-East religious conference, who had been invited to ride aboard the red-starred Soviet plane, was the last to climb down from the cabin.

Former Oregonian Raps Bay Region 'Trade Barrier'

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 20 (AP)—A former Oregon millwork salesman testified Wednesday that local AFL unions barred certain of his products from this area, and he was told that Oregon union men could "grow their own prunes" if the barrier cut their incomes so they could not buy California's.

The statement came from M. A. Peel of Berkeley, who formerly sold for the Central Door and Plywood corporation of Portland, Ore., and the Albany Sash and Door company of Albany, Ore.

Peel, a government witness in the anti-trust trial of 11 millwork manufacturers and eight units of the AFL carpenters' union, corroborated previous testimony of James Stewart, manager of the Symon Bros. Wrecking company of Oakland, Calif.

Stewart told the court that AFL unions forced him to buy only mill work and patterned lumber processed in five San Francisco bay area counties.

Peel today said he was "astounded at not being able to sell our merchandise in any part of the United States." He told of appealing to Walter O'Leary, of the Oakland AFL millmen's local, and of telling O'Leary the Oregon products also were AFL-produced.

He said he asked O'Leary "How are our workmen going to get along?" and "How are our men going to get money to buy California prunes?"

O'Leary responded, Peel said, with the statement that "they would have to get along as best they could" and "they'd have to grow their own prunes."
