## WHEAT PRICE CUT AS SOY BEANS DROP

CHICAGO, Nov. 21 (AP)—Post-holiday trading in grain futures today was dominated by weakness of soybeans, which fell as much as two cents a bushel at one time, carrying wheat down fractionally.

A large accumulation of receipts of beans, totaling 273 cars, had a bearish effect on prices but traders also expressed belief the weather forecast predicting a sharp drop in temperatures was a factor.

British purchases of Canadian wheat for December shipment, including some grain destined for Russia, attracted attention of wheat traders.

Wheat closed 1/2 cent lower to 1/4 cent higher compared with Wednesday, December 11-14-4, May 1-1941; corn unchanged to 1/4 cent higher, December 74-74 1/2, May 80; oats 1/2 cent to 1/4 cent up; rye unchanged and soybeans 1-1/2 lower.

## STOCK MARKET FINDS GOING ROUGH FRIDAY

NEW YORK, Nov. 21 (AP)—The stock market found the going somewhat rough at times today but persistent bidding for rails and selected industrials eventually steamed up recoveries in other parts of the list.

Even steels, which has lingered in the background from the start, tacked on modest plus signs in the final hour. While many leaders failed to get aboard, advances of fractions to a point or so were well spread over the ticker tape at the close. Transfers were around 800,000 shares.

Prominently supported members of the share division included Southern Railway preferred, which hit a new 1941 high; Atlantic Coast Line, Union Pacific, Chrysler, US Rubber preferred, International Harvester, Eastman Kodak, General Electric, and Kennecott.

Lacking climbing vigor were Liggett & Myers "B," which slipped to a new low for the year; American Can, Dow Chemical, US Gypsum, Woolworth and General Motors.

Carrier loans were selective upward movers in the bond department. Commodities were a shade mixed.
