

### HOSTAGE TERROR SURVEY REPORTED

LONDON, Nov. 21 (AP)—The inter-allied information committee asserted today that more than 100,000 persons had been killed, many thousands imprisoned, and whole villages deprived of meat or burned down in the "hostage terror" sweeping nine axis-occupied countries of Europe.

The committee's formal report said the system was first developed by the Italians in Albania in 1939, then perfected by the Germans and given "its most ruthless application" by the Bulgarians, who were said to have killed 15,000 persons in a single reprisal expedition in six Greek villages.

At least 82,000 Poles have been killed in two years by the Germans under the hostage system, the report said. It asserted that 300 of 2000 Polish ammunition workers were shot to break a strike.

More than 8000 persons were said to have been executed by the Germans in Yugoslavia. Every tenth man in some Yugoslav villages were said to have been shot and a number of villages burned in 100-for-1 retaliation for the slaying of soldiers.

Many former government leaders, professors and Jews were said to have died in the Netherlands. In Norway and Belgium no hostages were reported shot, but in Norway fathers of hundreds of boys who broke away to Britain were said to have been held.

Former army generals and hundreds of hostages were killed in Czechoslovakia, the report said, and at least 250 Frenchmen have been killed because of the assassination of German officers.

### Citrus Output for 1940-41 Hits New Peak, 340,000 Cars

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 21—Production of citrus fruit in the United States during the 1940-41 season exceeded that of any previous year and totaled 142,000,000 packed boxes, approximately 340,000 railway carloads or six million tons.

California and Arizona accounted for almost fifty per cent of the nation's citrus crop. The two western states produced fifty-five per cent of the oranges, nearly all of the lemons and about 10 per cent of the grapefruit.

These statements featured General Manager Paul S. Armstrong's report to the California Fruit Growers Exchange directors at the annual meeting in Los Angeles, Nov. 18. The board room in the Sunlight building was filled to capacity by over three hundred exchange growers and packing house managers from California and Arizona.

The total of 104,494 carloads of packed citrus fruits shipped from California and Arizona in the year which ended October 31, marks a gain of nearly 6000 cars over the record total of the previous year.

### Two Specialties Described To Fill Out Dinner Menu

Remove from fire. Fold hot custard gradually into beaten egg whites.

**Priscilla's Corn Pudding** (Ten Servings)  
Six tablespoons cornmeal, 6 tablespoons brown sugar, 2 1/2 teaspoons salt, 1 1/2 cups milk, 6 tablespoons butter, 3 eggs, 7 1/2 cups fresh or canned whole kernel corn (3 No. 2 cans), 5 tablespoons diced green pepper, 6 tablespoons minced onion, parsley.

Mix cornmeal, brown sugar and salt together in a bowl. Scald milk and melt butter in it. Pour gradually over cornmeal mixture, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Add well-beaten eggs, corn, green pepper and onion; combine thoroughly. Pour into a well-greased three-quart heat resistant glass baking dish; bake uncovered in a moderate oven (325 deg. F.) for about 1 1/2 hours, or until firm. Garnish with parsley and serve.

**Grape Custard Ring** (Serves 6)  
One-eighth teaspoon salt, 2 egg yolks, 1 cup milk, scalded, 2 egg whites stiffly beaten, 1 package lemon-flavored gelatin, 1 cup hot water, 1/2 cup grape juice, 1/2 teaspoon salt.

**MENU**  
BREAKFAST: Grapefruit juice, scrambled eggs, cornmeal muffins, coffee, milk.  
LUNCHEON: Black bean soup, chopped lettuce and enriched bread sandwiches, baked apples, tea, milk.

**DINNER:** Pan-broiled chopped round steak, mashed potatoes, stuffed onions, raw cranberry relish, squash pie, coffee, milk.

Add 1/2 teaspoon salt to egg yolks and beat slightly; then add hot milk gradually, stirring constantly. Cook and stir over hot water until mixture coats spoon.

### Authority on American Food Suggests Dessert

Lucy Maltby, noted American interpreter of what the average American family likes best to eat, has worked out this mouth-watering "old wine in new bottles" recipe.

#### BUTTERSCOTCH PUMPKIN PIE

(8 Servings)  
Pastry—2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 1/2 cup lard or other fat, 6 to 8 tablespoons ice water.

Filling—3 eggs, 1 cup dark brown sugar, 1/2 cup granulated sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg, 1/2 teaspoon ginger, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1 1/2 cups cooked pumpkin, 1 1/2 cups milk.

Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cut in shortening until the size of lima beans with a pastry blender or two knives. Add ice water a little at a time, mixing it in with a fork. Pat dough together and chill if possible.

For the filling, separate eggs; beat yolks until foamy. Mix with yolks the brown sugar, granulated sugar, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg, ginger, cloves and pumpkin. Scald milk and add to pumpkin mixture.

Roll out about three quarters of dough on floured board. Line 10-inch pie plate, leaving about an inch overlapping the edges. Make double upright fold and pinch between thumb and forefinger to make fluted rim. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold into pumpkin mixture. Pour filling into pastry lined pan. Roll out remainder of dough and cut pastry turkeys with turkey cutter. Place on top of filling.

Bake in a hot oven (450 degrees F.) for 10 minutes. Then reduce heat of oven to 350 degrees F. and continue baking for 30 minutes or until knife comes out clean when inserted into pumpkin custard.
