Football Briefs

PORTLAND, Nov. 21 (AP)—Oregon State college, a team that is trying to counterpunch its way into the Rose bowl, takes on small but potentially dangerous Montana here tomorrow.

The game, secondary to the 42nd Washington-Oregon battle at Seattle, still was expected to draw 10,000 because of OSC's mention in Rose bowl gossip and because of belated interest in the Beavers' shifting defense.

This system of improvising resistance has been developed to new limits, Beaver partisans claim. It baffled and blanked a Stanford team which had won 13 straight games, and limited seven opponents to 28 points.

Portland handicappers gave Montana little chance to win unless the Beavers get to day-dreaming about Pasadena. Coach Lon Stiner is worried. He warns that the Grizzlies have won six out of eight games and have a fine scoring record.

PULLMAN, Nov. 21 (AP)—The sideline quarterbacks were predicting today the arm that made Billy Sewell the nation's leading 1940 passer will fill the Gonzaga stadium air with footballs tomorrow when Washington State meets the Zags in Spokane.

The Sewell arm, injured in an early contest, has been hardly more than a psychological threat to enemy teams in recent weeks, keeping the defense spread so the ground attack could move.

This week, however, Sewell has been tossing practice aerials by the dozen to State's great wingmen, Dale Gentry and Nick Susoeff.
