Portland Meat Tieup Ended

PORTLAND, Nov. 22 (AP)—A three-week tie-up of the major meat markets in Portland ended today.

Employers and AFL meat cutters signed an agreement last night that settled a wage dispute. Details were not disclosed. The union had asked a wage boost from \$40 to \$47.50 for a 48-hour week.

The union struck at the Portland Provision company early this month, and other members of the Oregon Meat council shut down the next day in what unionists called a lockout. Five hundred workers were affected.

Animal hair taken from hides and pelts, including hog bristles, by American meat packing plants last year totaled 24,733, 169 pounds, valued at \$1,302, 037, according to the census.

LABOR REPORTS UPSET TRENDS IN STOCK LIST

NEW YORK, Nov. 22 (AP)—Adverse labor winds tended to re-verse progress in the stock market today and make some slight-ly uneven trends in most depart-ments.

Hesitancy ruled at the opening and fractional declines were plentiful at the close.

Volume again was propped by tax selling of low-priced issues. Transfers for the two hours ap-proximated 400,000 shares, one of the largest Saturday aggre-gates of the year to date.

Motors were at a standstill the greater part of the time as Oc-tober retail sales of new passenger cars were placed at 36 per cent under the like 1940 month.

Stocks edged upward now and then including U. S. Rubber, Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, Glenn Martin, American Smelting, N. Y. Central, duPont and Union Carbide.

Faltering were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Western Union, Santa Fe, Chrysler, Anaconda, Eastman Kodak, Boeing and Inter-national Harvester.

Bonds steadied and commodi-ties were irregularly lower.

GRAINS WIPE OUT EARLY DECLINES

CHICAGO, Nov. 22 (AP)—Early weakness in grain and soybean prices gave way today to a recovery trend, with cereals re-gaining much or all of the losses and soybeans wiping out most of a downturn of 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 cents.

Government plans to export some federally owned wheat and an increase in the amount of 1941 grain under loan to 312, 870,000 bushels were considered strengthening factors.

Wheat closed 1/4 higher than yesterday, December \$1.14 1/2, May \$1.20-1.20 1/2; corn 1/4 off to 1 1/4, December 73 1/4, May 79 1/4; oats unchanged to 1/4 down; rye un-changed and soybeans 1/4 lower.

Government Case Against Lumber Ban Continues

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 22 (AP)—One San Francisco lumber yard operator had to pay a bay district mill \$140 for re-sanding 28,000 board feet of door jams he bought in Longview, Wash., even though the lumber actually was not treated at all.

The testimony was offered yesterday as part of the govern-ment's case in the federal court trial of 11 millwork companies in the San Francisco area and eight units of the AFL Brother-hood of Carpenters and Joiners. They are accused in anti-trust indictments of having conspired to exclude from this territory any patterned lumber processed by outside mills.

The witness was William Jef-ferson. He said that when the Longview shipment arrived, Charles Helbing, identified as business agent for a carpenters' union, told him the lumber could not be used here "unless it is re-run by local men."

It was then, he continued, that he sent the door jams to the mill and got them back with a \$140 bill.

"Actually the lumber was never touched," he declared. "It was just sent back with a union label on it."

Edward A. Allen, another lum-ber dealer, told of an experience much the same. In his case, how-ever, he said the local mill charged him only for stamping the carpenters' union label on the lumber and not for any pro-cessing. This charge, he said, ran to about \$1.75 for every 1,000 board feet.

The trial was in recess today.

10 MILLION RED LOSSES CLAIMED

BERLIN, Nov. 22, (AP)—Au-thorized German sources said today that 10,000,000 Russians had been killed, wounded or captured in the five months of war with the soviet union, ended Friday. The figure was cited in what they termed a "sur-vey of Hitler's strategy of de-struction."

The Germans listed 3,702, 060 prisoners.

The Germans said that 15, 877 Russian planes had been captured or destroyed, 27,452 tanks destroyed or captured and 27,129 guns seized or smashed. Also listed as destroyed were 52 Russian warships, with 59 damaged, and 138 merchant-ships sunk and 137 damaged.

Consumption of Lumber Increases

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22 (AP)—The lumber survey committee of the commerce department now estimates that lumber consump-tion this year will total 32,200, 000,000 board feet. This will be 11 per cent more than last year's total and will approach the 35,800,000,000 mark of 1929.

Domestic lumber production was estimated at 23,000,000, 000 board feet, a gain of 13 per cent, and imports of lumber also were on the up-grade. Stockpile purchases of lumber by the gov-ernment were said to be keep-ing production at a high rate.

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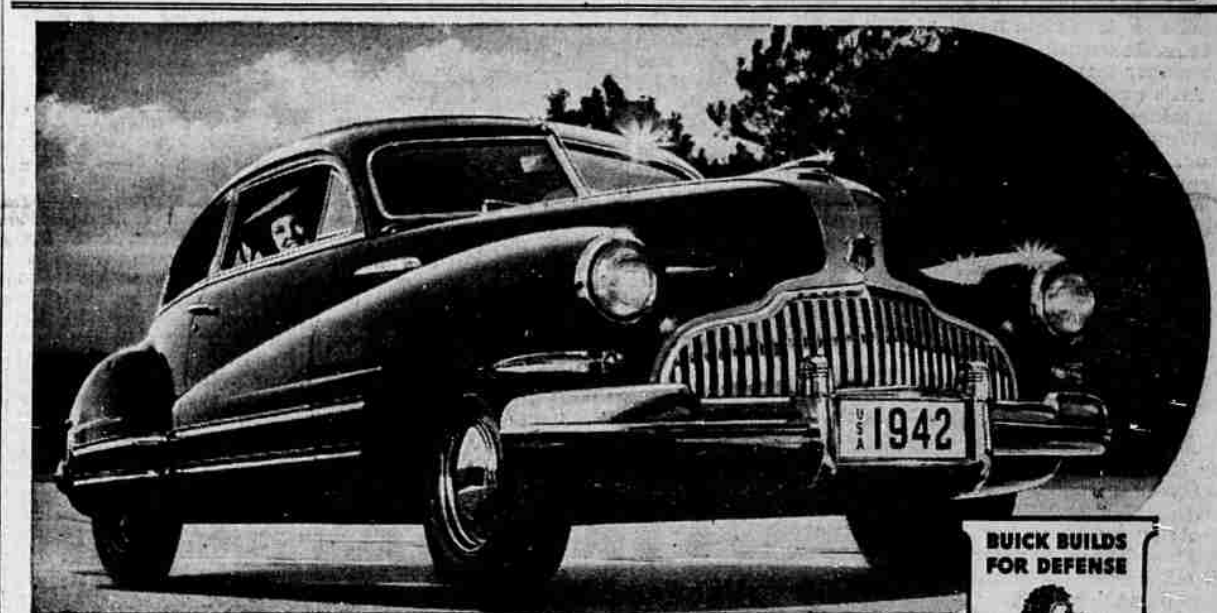
