Concluding a series of practice talks on defense savings bonds which the Toastmistresses are to give before different organizations throughout the Klamath basin, members of the club spoke Monday night, November the seventeenth, at the chamber of commerce.

Introducing the feature speakers, Mrs. Carl Schubert, toastmistress of the evening, dwelt upon the horror created by Germany in her march across the European continent, in striking contrast to the peace and freedom of the American people who do not sufficiently appreciate their privileges.

"We are a great nation blessed with an inspiring past and ideal opportunities for future services to humanity," said Mrs. Emmett Chidester in her speech. "We too often take for granted the blessings we as a nation enjoy, provided for us by the sacrifices of our forefathers."

Mrs. Chidester urged the systematic purchase of defense bonds saying that the "E" type bond is known as the "peoples' bond" because it was created to meet the demands of the small investor. In conclusion Mrs. Chidester said, "We often forget that it is upon fine ideals that the foundation of freedom rests and it is on the continuity of these fine ideals that freedom must be based."
