

HITLER FACES NEW PROBLEM, LOSS IN LIBYA

The five-day-old battle in the sands of Cyrenaica has changed the face of the war and presented Adolf Hitler with a problem he never had before—what to do about an army desperately on the defensive, far from home and facing annihilation.

In almost every element it is German blitzkrieg in complete reverse. For the first time the British are more powerful, better armed, better supplied. The battle is of their own choosing and the battlefield gives them almost unlimited space in which to move their weapons; so swiftly that the damage is done long before it can be properly comprehended.

The German armies are divided and the halves are encircled; their tanks and armored cars are beating their iron heads to pieces against harder, better weapons. Even the weather has turned sour on Hitler; a coastal deluge on the birth of the British offensive bogged his planes down on his airfields and, field accounts say, the vast imperial parade across the Egyptian frontier had scarcely any hindrance from the air.

It is only necessary to read the German and Italian communiques to tell how gravely this campaign is regarded in axis land. Beyond the bare mention of axis counter-attacks there has been no serious axis effort to claim that the British are being impeded.

Even now Hitler must be contemplating the necessity of abandoning these thousands of German African fighters to military destruction.

What this will do to the mentality of the German folks back home, who have been industriously sold on the idea that German soldiers and German weapons are invincible, becomes, then, a matter of urgent consideration.

In the first place it is imperative that there be big victories somewhere else—hence the vast and reckless new drive in the jaws of Russia at the start of the sixth month of the eastern war. The first prize of this drive—Rostov-on-Don—was proclaimed to the so-called master race with a great tooting of radio trumpets this morning; it looks now as if Hitler is out at all costs to take Moscow, itself, by Christmas.

Furthermore, Hitler is trying to pull the French back into the war as an ally, endeavoring to bring about a state of belligerency between the untested French armies of north Africa and the British which will keep his enemies occupied below the Mediterranean for a long time and assure the axis of African coastal bases, no matter what happens to the German panzer forces now trapped in the desert.

General Weygand, who wanted no part of such a deal, has been fired on Hitler's order.

WRITER GETS INSIDE VIEW ON REDS' LIFE

KUIBYSHEV, Russia, Nov. 21 (Delayed AP)—By boat and train from Britain I have just reached this second seat of the Russian government on a journey that offered an unusual chance to observe life behind Russia's vast fighting front.

The 2500-mile trip took our party into Asia beyond the Urals and showed us a panorama of people unexcited, unafraid, and confident of victory.

The reactions of civilians in the bombed cities are no different from those in London, Plymouth and Coventry.

Trains bearing whole families, including their workers, families, even baby carriages, passed us in hundreds of places. Not one person—and we talked to dozens—was pessimistic.

Everywhere we went, the food was plentiful. People from farms flocked to the sidings when our train stopped, selling milk, bread, butter, beets, pickles and sausages. In cities, we bought caviar and wine—all we wanted.

There was one consolation of this tiring trip, two days from Kuibyshev, when we met some people who were also riding the hard way and gave them our water jug.

"How long have you been traveling?" asked the English-speaking mother of two daughters.

We told her our tale, then asked her the same question.

"Four months," she replied, matter-of-factly.

And they still had 700 miles to go! But they said goodbye with smiles, no complaints.

Our journey took 40 days and 40 nights.
