

SENATE GIVES APPROVAL OF GUIANA MOVE

The Dutch colony have been uneasy about conditions in the French pout colony ever since the fall of France. The cessation of French food shipments has worsened the plight of some 10,000 convicts there, and many of the regular guards have deserted. An easily forded river separates the two colonies, and until the recent arrival of Dutch reinforcements from England, only a few hundred men could be mustered in Dutch Guiana's defense.

BERLIN, Nov. 25 (AP) — The sending of troops to Dutch Guiana was called "the first military attack of the United States on South America" today by the authoritative commentary, Dienst Aus Deutschland, which said the action was directed against French colonial possessions in the western hemisphere.

"Greatest attention" is being given in Berlin to this latest development, the commentary service added.

This "is only the first step to action directed against French Guiana," Vichy French colony adjacent to the Netherlands territory, said Dienst.

The statement compared the American action to the British attacks last year at Oron and Dakar in French Africa and noted that the occupation coincided with the British offensive in Libya.

"The United States wants to get closer to the bridgehead, Natal (Brazil) - Dakar," said Dienst.

In the face of strong administration support for this method, Rep. Gore (D-Tenn.) led a movement for substitution by amendment of his over-all proposal, contending that it would prove far more efficient and far less discriminatory. Amid the conflicting debate of the wage question, there was renewed discussion of a modified form of wage control, similar to that proposed by the American farm bureau federation, under which the price administrator could prevent the granting of wage increases if he deemed them inflationary. House leaders said, however, they did not intend to make a leadership fight for any such provision although some of them suggested it might be a good compromise.

Largest Troop Convoy Arrives Safely in Britain

A BRITISH PORT, Nov. 25 (AP) — The Fifth Canadian (armored) division has landed safely in Britain in the largest troop convoy ever to reach Britain and authoritative sources said tonight it had been escorted part way across the North Atlantic by United States warships.

Included in the convoy were 75 United States army air corps and signal corps experts who will join many others already arrived in observing and advising on operation of Britain's radio locators. A number of American who had joined the royal Canadian air force also landed.

Bullitt Named Near East Envoy By Roosevelt

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (AP) — William C. Bullitt, former ambassador to Russia and later to France, was named by President Roosevelt today to be his special representative to the near east.

The president, announcing the appointment at a press conference said Bullitt would gather information about fast-breaking developments in the eastern Mediterranean area, find out needs and return and report to him.

Asked where Bullitt would be based, the president replied jokingly, in a plane. Then he added that the former ambassador probably would visit the areas around Libya where British and axis forces are engaged in bitter warfare; in the vicinity of the Nile and Red sea, and perhaps Palestine.

vision failed to report for work yesterday, said a large number of employees, including production workers in other departments, had joined the strike today.

One spokesman declared "some men are working" but added that production would halt completely in a few days if the strike continues.

Curtiss-Wright employs about 600 persons and has more than \$100,000,000 in orders for army and navy training planes and army transports.

Lloyd Weber, business agent of District Council No. 9 of the International Association of Machinists, which called the strike Monday because of a jurisdictional dispute with the AFL hoisting engineers and carpenters' unions, declared it was "more than 90 per cent effective."

He said more than 400 plants were closed or partially affected by the strike.

acknowledged the fall of a small Italian garrison north of Gialo Oasis, reporting it was overpowered after a tenacious defense against British motorized columns.

However, a high fascist said the British appearance in an area more than 210 miles from the Egyptian border was not an advance but a "march" over empty desert spaces where garrisons are lacking.

The Italians said the British troops in the northern desert had failed to make contact with the long-besieged Tobruk garrison. British attempts to force a way out of the Tobruk fort were reported repulsed by the Italians, with 12 British tanks destroyed and three planes shot down.

OMAHA, Nov. 25 (AP) — Two trainmen were killed and three injured in a freight train collision at Edson, Wyo., last night, the Union Pacific railroad announced today.

Officials said a westbound freight hit another westbound train in the middle as it was pulling out of a switch onto the main line. Twenty-one cars and their contents were destroyed by fire.

Killed were Walter W. Martin of Laramie, engineer on the main line train, and Lewis H. Haberland, Laramie, fireman on the same train. Their bodies were found in the ruins of their cab at dawn.

French Indo-China Regrets Bombing

SAIGON, French Indo-China, Nov. 25 (AP) — The government-general today asked the United States consul, Sydney Browne, to convey its regret to Washington over the bombing of the U. S. consulate Sunday night.

An official communication said the government was taking all possible steps to find the persons who planted the bomb.

It was the first occurrence of this kind in the history of Indo-China and aroused the widest consternation. Censors would not pass the news stories on it until two days later.
