

BRITISH SEE HUGE BATTLE COMING SOON

farther east into its encircling line of axis troops and captured more prisoners and 24 field guns, the communists said.

It said that considerable British tank reinforcements previously held in reserve had now reached the forward battle areas to join other armored forces which had been reorganized for resumption of fighting in the Rezegh area.

The Tobruk garrison has been penetrating "steadily eastward" from the positions captured in the first two days of their original drive.

ROME, Nov. 26 (P)—British units encircled south of Rezegh, 10 miles below Tobruk, have been annihilated and two American observers were among more than 5000 prisoners captured in heavy fighting in the Libyan desert, the Italian high command said today.

With these successes, however, the Italians acknowledged the capture by "overwhelming British forces" of the Gialo oasis in the southern Libyan desert, where a British motor column was sweeping westward from Giarabub in an attempt to reach El Agheila, on the Gulf of Sirte.

All fierce attacks launched by three British divisions against the positions held by the Savona division have been "smashed by the iron-like resistance of our troops," the high command declared.

It reported more than 20 tanks were destroyed and many others hit.

Several American and British newspapermen also were taken prisoner along with two British officers, General Sperling, whose capture was reported previously, and General B. F. Armstrong, commander of a South African brigade.

(The British have said they did not know of a "General Sperling.")

Gen. White Given Military Honors By 41st Division

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 26 (P)—Major-General George A. White, commander of the 41st division, was buried with military honors today.

An artillery caisson carried the casket through downtown streets. It was escorted by 2500 soldiers from the 41st division, who paused at an intersection and presented arms while the general's body slowly passed by.

Master Sgt. Fred W. Schlingman, senior non-commissioned officer of the division, carried the general's two-star flag as the funeral cortege proceeded from Trinity Episcopal church to Riverview cemetery for burial in the family plot.

Oregon American Legion posts will drape department and post colors with the official badge of mourning for 30 days in honor of the general. White, who died Sunday, was one of the founders of the legion.

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AID OF CITIES ASKED TO GET POWER SURVEY

The county Bonneville Power committee has invited representatives of various Klamath municipalities to attend a meeting Monday afternoon at the Klamath city hall for a consideration of the proposed petition to ask the state hydroelectric commission to make a survey here.

A. M. Thomas, secretary of the county group, said that notices have been sent to Klamath Falls, Chiloquin, Merrill, Malin and Bonanza.

Thomas pointed out that the city council of Klamath Falls has agreed to cooperate with the county committee in obtaining signatures on petitions to have the survey made. He stated that this commits the city no further than that, and that councilmen can decide what they want to do when the survey is made.

Other cities, he said, will be asked if they wish to cooperate in similar fashion.

"What is wanted now is a study by a disinterested party which will show whether a Bonneville power program here is feasible," said Thomas. "That is what the city and the county committee are asking through the petitions."

He said the proposed power district would cover the territory now served in Klamath county by the California Oregon Power company.

TESTS UNDERTAKEN ON SIGNAL LIGHTS

Tests were run on individual traffic lights in the new system at various downtown intersections Wednesday by the contractors, Trowbridge and Flynn. The lights will not be turned on until "wait and walk" plates for the pedestrian signals arrive.

Purpose of the tests was to discover any short-circuits and to get the timing properly adjusted.

City Engineer E. A. Thomas said that John Beakey, state traffic engineer, was called to Salem Wednesday, but will return for the formal starting of the signal system.

Thomas conferred with the city police department Wednesday and began work on various regulations in connection with the signal operation. These regulations will be announced when complete.

Murder Charge Filed Against Wreck Suspect

BEOVAWE, Nev., Nov. 26 (P)—In order to prosecute Clarence J. Alexander, 24, on his confession that he wrecked the streamliner, City of San Francisco in 1939, District Attorney W. R. Reynolds of Eureka county, Nevada, today filed a murder charge against the suspect.

Reynolds filed a complaint in justice court here today charging Alexander with first degree murder of Miss Helen Henry, 30, Oakland, Calif., resident who was killed in the wreck.

BEOVAWE, Nev., Nov. 26 (P)—W. R. Reynolds, district attorney of Eureka county, Nevada, today filed a complaint in justice court here charging Clarence J. Alexander, suspected of wrecking a streamliner train in 1939, with first degree murder of Miss Helen Henry, 30, Oakland, Calif.

The complaint charges murder in the attempt to perpetrate robbery of passengers of the wrecked "City of San Francisco" after derailment of the train had been accomplished.

This means, Reynolds said, that the train was wrecked for the purpose of robbing passengers.

"I already have Alexander's confession in my possession," Reynolds said, "and I understand he will waive extradition."

Alexander, a former section hand, is now being detained at Susanville, Calif., by Sheriff Olin Johnson of Lassen county.

Sheriff Johnson had said he was convinced Alexander caused the night-time wreck which killed 24 persons and injured 108 near Harney, Nev., on Aug. 12, 1939.

BERLIN, Nov. 26 (P)—German shock troops were declared today to have made "considerable progress" on the Moscow front where a spokesman said fighting now was raging in the "inner defense lines" of the soviet capital.

(A Vichy broadcast heard by NBC said nazi mechanized forces had broken through southwest of Klin and were only 25 kilometers—less than 16 miles—from Moscow.)

The Germans were said to be increasing their pressure steadily at the approaches to the city. A spokesman said the "weather there was not cold enough to interfere seriously with the onslaught."

NAZIS TO DESTROY BELGRADE, REPORT

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to raze Belgrade, which will be surrounded by troops and exposed to bombardment by artillery and from the air. Those giving the government these reports are convinced that the Germans have decided to carry this attack on in the same way as they have done previously in the city of Sabac.

Sabac is about 30 miles west of Belgrade. (The exact origin of the report that Belgrade would be destroyed was not given by Early, but last Tuesday the London Daily Mail quoted Gen. Dusan Simovic, Yugoslav premier, as saying that he had "sure information" this was to be done in reprisal.)

Some 100 woods employees of the Long-Bell Lumber company of Weed, Calif., will ballot tonight in a National Labor Relations board representation election at Modoc Camp 1, finishing up the two-day poll which resulted from an NLRB hearing in Klamath Falls early in the fall.

Employees at the Tennant camp voted Tuesday night. Results of the vote will be announced late tonight for the two camps which are classed as one unit. Both the AFL and the CIO are listed on the ballot.

Meanwhile, the five-week-old strike of 1200 mill employees of Long-Bell continued without change in the situation. Negotiations, last held a week ago, are expected to be resumed some time this week.

He is accused in the hold-up case in which Dr. Salem A. David, a chiropractor, was killed in a battle with bandits at the rear of the South Sixth street eating establishment.

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child's play in comparison. . . . I believe the day is coming when the American people will call the president and his Jewish counselors to account."

The United States, Von Ribbentrop told statesmen of the axis and its satellite nations, remains the last powerful ally of Britain. He added that Hitler long had calculated upon the hostility of a "small clique of leaders" in the United States.

He added, however, that any idea of a German military attack on the United States was "fantastic foolishness," and said that charges that Hitler planned world conquest, destruction of religion, and Nazi dominance of South America were products of deliberate propaganda nurtured by the American president.

do the work and to decide on which streets money should be spent.

Officials Speak

Representatives of small cities said they will have to depend upon the state to do the work, as they are not equipped for construction of this nature. Larger cities, like Klamath Falls, have paving plants and could do the job themselves and would like to have the money without strings attached.

Mayor F. E. Trotman of Merrill said that the highway commission proposed to "spend the U. S. money on streets which were of less vital importance than others needing work."

Recorder Irving Capek of Malin pointed out that work is badly needed on the street leading to the Malin depot, which carries huge quantities of potatoes at certain seasons of the year.

Councilman Clyde Van Meter of Malin offered the only questioning note in the city action on the gas tax. He said he felt the cities should be careful not to dip into funds for purposes other than those for which the funds were originally set up.

But league officials quickly replied that the original purpose of the gas tax money is for highways, roads and streets, and the cities want the money for streets.

For years, the gas tax issue has been discussed in Oregon. Highway commissioners and those who agree with them assert the gas tax funds should be used in constructing the primary and secondary roads.

Cities want a slice of the money for non-highway city streets.

License Money

Buffalo, said that he was with 25 or 30 men on a raft about 25 feet from the sinking Reuben James when two depth charge blasts sent the raft spinning like a top and that when he swam back to the raft only 15 men were on it.

Lloyd Sims, Marianna, Fla., water tender, said that depth charge blasts tore his life jacket to pieces and that he swam almost four hours before being rescued by another destroyer.

Joseph Molnar, 19, fireman of Allentown, Pa., said seaman Jesse Weaver, West Point, Tenn., and William H. Painter, Greenville, S. C., swam to his raft and "just went under."

Secretary of Navy Knox said at his press conference in Washington today that there were two depth charge explosions, although "we don't know with what effect."

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
