BIDDING HELPS STEADY PARTS OF STOCK LIST

NEW YORK, Nov. 27 (AP)—Fardy bidding helped steady parts of today's stock market but many leaders continued well out on a shaky limb.

Steels drew some support, with Bethlehem especially favored, and tobacco stiffened after an early relapse.

Tax selling remained as one of the important brakes on recovery, brokers said. This, despite exceptionally slow intervals, put the day's volume to around 800,000 shares.

Another wide assortment of cheerful dividends and earnings reports propped scattered stocks but were virtually ignored by others. Some speculative nibbling was due to the belief the industrial average, within reaching distance of the 1941 bottom established last April, was in a position to do a brisk right about.

Stocks in the "new low" class — some substantially revived — included General Motors, Chrysler, American Telephone, Consolidated Edison, Public Service of N. J., Sears Roebuck, Pennsylvania, Reynolds Tobacco "B" and American Tobacco "B."

Up most of the session were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Youngs-Town Steel, Southern Pacific, Chesapeake & Ohio, Goodrich, Montgomery Ward, Consolidated Aircraft, General Electric and Union Carbide. Liggett & Myers "B" turned a forenoon backslide into a net advance.

GRAIN MARKET IN RECOVERY TREND

CHICAGO, Nov. 27 (AP)—Striking a recovery trend after several sessions of downward drift, grain prices today registered gains ranging from fractions to more than a cent a bushel while soybeans advanced more than three cents at one time.

The fact the price declines had reduced prices in most cases to the lowest levels for a month attracted support in all pits. Defeat of the Gore amendment to price control legislation was regarded as a bullish factor. The government loan programs with respect to wheat and corn also exerted a stronger influence inasmuch as prices had dipped about 3 cents for wheat and more than 10 cents for corn below loan rates on a Chicago basis.

Wheat closed 1-1/2 cents higher than yesterday, December \$1.13-1/2; May \$1.10-1/2; corn 1-1/2c up, December 72-1/2c, May 70c; oats 1-1/2c higher; rye 1-1/2c up and soybeans 24-3/4c higher.

Potatoes Lead Oregon Shipments

SALEM, Nov. 27 (AP)—Cariot shipments of fruits and vegetables during October totaled 2278 cars and 1183 trucklots, compared with 2142 cars and 431 trucklots in September, the state department of agriculture said today.

Potatoes accounted for the largest movement, with 99 cars and 701 trucks, followed by pears, onions, and apples.

BOSTON WOOL

BOSTON, Nov. 27 (AP-USA)—Fine wools were receiving some demand today in the Boston wool market. Original twelve months Texas scoured sold at mostly \$1.10-1.13, scoured basis, which is equivalent to 46-47 cents, in the grease, for wools shrinking around 58 per cent and to 41-

42 cents, in the grease, for wools shrinking around 63 per cent. Fine combing Ohio Delaine fleeces were moving in limited volume at 44-45 cents, in the grease.

Twelve of the 40 samples of coffee cream analyzed by the laboratory of the state department of agriculture in October were illegal. This means that the butterfat content was under the 18 per cent required by law.
