past week. The reports mentioned not only large troop transports into northern and southern Indo-China but also large shipments of war materials of all kinds including aviation gasoline.

Some of the reports held out a possibility of a Japanese thrust, perhaps into Thailand, within the next few days.

The Tokyo newspaper Asahi, in a special dispatch from Hanoi today accused French Indo-China of a changed attitude toward Japan as a result of the negotiations between Japan and the United States and other factors.

In the state department's eyes the alternative now is clear.

It was for Japan to accept or reject the formula of basic principles which the United States considered essential to the maintenance of peace and security in the Far East.

Hull's restatement of those basic principles was accompanied by recommendations for their practical application by Japan in the Orient. Practical application, it was said, would involve abandonment of a program of aggression, withdrawal of troops from China and French Indo-China, and the inauguration of a peaceful economic policy.

10,000 Germans were killed and wounded. More than 50 tanks, 400 trucks, 130 guns and 88 machineguns were captured and 50 planes brought down. Pravda's correspondent continued. In addition, he said, 85 machineguns, 10 mine thrower batteries, 70 guns, 1380 trucks and 115 tanks were destroyed.

ROME, Nov. 27 (AP)—Axis forces have retaken Sidi Omar, near the Libyan-Egyptian frontier, the Italian high command said today.

(The British admitted yesterday that an axis column had smashed across the Egyptian frontier in the Sidi area, about 30 miles from the coast, and today said parts of this column still were "circulating" on both sides of the border with the British "hunting" them.)

The high command re-asserted that Bardia, which the British claimed they captured on Nov. 22, still was in Italian hands. The Italians said further British sorties from besieged Tobruk were repulsed while 10 miles to the south at Rezegh fighting again flared up between tank units.

Long-Bell Woods Crew at Tennant, Weed Favor AFL

Results of a two-day poll of nearly 200 Long-Bell Lumber company employees of Weed and Tennant, Calif., were announced late last night, the combined vote giving the American Federation of Labor a definite majority over CIO in the national labor relations board representation election.

The poll, resulting from an NLRB hearing in Klamath Falls earlier in the fall, was completed last night at Modoc Camp 1. Employees at the Tennant camp voted Tuesday night.

Pre-election campaigning between the rival unions was reported to have been enlivened Monday night at one of the camps by a fist fight between Wilbur Yeoman, AFL representative, and George Brown, district CIO organizer. The fight was said to have developed after a verbal altercation between the two.

Meanwhile, the five-week-old strike of 1200 mill employees of Long-Bell continued without change in the situation. Negotiations, last held a week ago, were expected to be resumed some time this week.

Published reports said Republic Steel corporation and the National Steel corporation had not agreed to abide by the arbitration board's future decision.

Machinists Back

In general, the labor situation seemed improved. A jurisdictional strike of 8500 AFL machinists in the St. Louis area was ended and another special presidential fact-finding board held a preliminary meeting with Mr. Roosevelt before opening new hearings in Washington today asked the companies whether they would accept the board's findings as final after reports were published that two steel firms had not agreed to accept them.

doomed to failure, the debate afforded John McGovern, one of the independent laborites, an opportunity to charge, among other things, that the United States was "prepared to use British bodies to blast her way into the markets of the continent."

The amendment was defeated 326 to 2. (Apparently two of the independent laborites had been called on to act as tellers as in the past.)

Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden urged rejection of the independent laborites' amendment, asserting, "there is a job of work to be done and I hope the house will encourage the government to get on with the job by rejecting the amendment."

Eden denied in passing an assertion yesterday by German Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop that Britain had been assured in 1940 that Russia would join the war on Britain's side.

McGovern, outspoken critic of Churchill's government, who called the Atlantic charter "one of the grossest pieces of deceit of modern times," charged that the United States is attempting to extend the "old financial system of Wall street" in Europe.
