Cuts-Fall Slack Lats Pine Output

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 28 (AP)—The Thanksgiving holiday period and usual late-fall slack lowered western pine lumber production to 66,436,000 board feet for the week ending November 22. The figure for the previous week was 73,280,000 and for the same week last year 66,982,000, the Western Pine association reported.

Orders fell sharply to 58,016,000 board feet compared with 64,426,000 for the previous week and 72,493,000 for the corresponding week of 1940. Shipment figures in that order: 69,690,000; 73,463,000, and 82,473,000.

ROME, Nov. 28 (AP)—British planes caused "notable damage" during raids on Naples last night, an Italian communique said today.

Thailand Council Approves Defense Act for Emergency

BANGKOK, Thailand, Nov. 27 (delayed) (AP)—The Thailand National Assembly approved today a defense measure which the defense minister, Lieut.-Gen. Luang Promyothi, declared empowered the government to prepare for war and act to meet any emergency.

Several hours later Premier Luang Bipul Songgram, in his first radio address to the nation since the Thai-French Indo-China conflict, said the nation might yet be able to avoid becoming involved in war although Thailand is confronted with political, economic and military pressure "from all quarters."

(In Tokyo, the newspaper Yomiuri said Japan's ambassador to Bangkok conferred for more than an hour Friday with Premier Songgram, and the newspaper Nichi Nichi reported under a Bangkok dateline that the British had stationed more than 50,000 troops along Thai frontiers.)

Trade unionism in the United States is going through the stages that trade unionism in this country did a generation ago. It is finding its feet.—Austin Hopkinson, British member of parliament.

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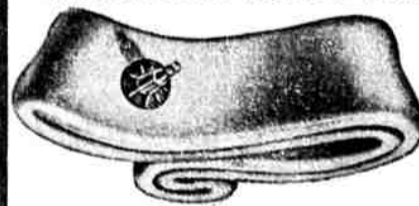


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
