This did not happen by accident. Italian and German communiques, which form the his-torical official report of the axis side of the war, are carefully co-ordinated before they are made public. That is one reason why they usually lag a little behind

the fighting.

Manifestations of this kind strengthen the impression that the amount of men and material which Hitler can-or will-exwhich Hitler can—or will—ex-pend in the desert campaign has very definite limits. With rein-forcement of the German armor-ed forces in Libya difficult or inexpedient, the German fuehrer lakes the best way out—he lands the battle banner to il

duce.
Were the axis sure of victory in Circuaica, one may be certain that Germany would be prepar-ing to take full credit for it. Instead, the axis is facing the very real possibility of defeat, and Hitler cannot afford to take the

responsibility for defeat.
