# '41 TULELAKE SUGAR BEET

TULELAKE—Harvest of the IP41 sugar beet crop was com-pleted Saturday and prospects for the 1942 planting were out-lined in a weekend meeting of growers by George Wright, gen-eral manager of the Sacramento division of the Spreckles com-pany. Wright was accompanied here by A. L. Knudson, labor su-perintendent for the same divi-tion. About 70 expenses and were perintendent for the same division. Contracts for next season's crop will be available at the of-fice of W. H. Anderson, Siskiyou county agricultural commis-sioner, on December 8 when a representative of the Spreckles wompany will be present to assist those planning on a beet acreage. Labor problems, both past and

A minimum guarantee of \$8.40 per ton, of which \$2 per ton is the government benefit payment tax is announced, according to Clark W. Fensler, local representative of the sugar company. The price is based on an 18 per cent sugar content Possibility of an increase over the minimum is advanced, the increase hinging on action of congress this week in regard to increases in benefit payments on

the crop. All acreage restrictions have been lifted by the administration and a much larger acreage is anticipated for 1942. Approximate-1100 acres were harvested this season.

While the unfavorable seaso cut acreage yields slightly, dsta on tonnage and sugar content now being compiled at Sacramento is expected to show favorable returns.

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

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
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
