Reynolds, secretary of the Klamath county chamber of commerce; Saturday, December 13, 9:15 p. m., R. Paul Roberts, president of the Klamath County Public Health association, sponsor of the seal sale, and Dr. P. H. Rozendal, county health officer.

On Wednesday, Mrs. Fred Heilbroner, president of the Klamath chapter of League of Women Voters, spoke to a radio audience and on Monday evening, Arnold Gralapp, KUHS principal, was the first speaker. As a result of publicity extended the seal sale, Mrs. Burt E. Hawkins, general chairman, stated Thursday that she has received calls personally for seals to be sent to those not receiving them.

The chairman also disclosed that the first day's mail brought in a check for \$25 to be used in the work of the tuberculosis association in prevention, treatment and research work. Funds retained by the Klamath association are used especially for chest x-rays, upkeep of the x-ray equipment at the health department, for tuberculin tests and follow-up of these tests.

Retailers Hear Explanation of Credit Rulings

Retailers desiring information on "Regulation W," the recent federal restriction on installment credit buying, attended a special forum meeting Thursday noon at the Pelican cafe. Mitchell Tillotson, manager of the Klamath Falls branch of the First National bank of Portland, was meeting chairman.

E. N. Crouch, head of the credit department of the federal reserve bank and J. King Bryon, managing director of the Retail Furniture Association of Oregon, who are making a tour of the state, were present to answer all questions relative to the application and latest interpretation of the regulation. Bryon had sent special invitations to local members of the Retail Furniture association. All retailers in Klamath Falls and neighboring communities were also invited, according to Tillotson.

"Recent changes in the field of installment selling raised many questions in the minds of retailers," Tillotson said. "Because of the bank's interest in installment financing, we were particularly glad to help sponsor this general forum."

KANSAS PRISONER RELEASED HERE

Kenneth J. Dinsmore, arrested in the city at the request of Johnson county, Kansas, authorities, on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, was released by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg late Thursday.

Dinsmore is charged, according to the complaint, with having signed an agreement to deliver 500 bulletins and an out-of-door neon sign to the First Christian church in Olathe, Kansas.

Alvorne D. E. Van Vactor, representing Dinsmore, appeared in court with a petition for writ of habeas corpus, arguing successfully that the charge did not state his client had failed to live up to the agreement.

Assistant District Attorney Clarence Humble advised Judge Vandenberg that Governor Charles A. Sprague had granted extradition of Dinsmore.

"That puts the governor of Oregon in a peculiar spot as I'm going to release the man," remarked Judge Vandenberg from the bench.

Lone Bandit Gets \$1500 at St. Johns

PORTLAND, Dec. 4 (AP)—A lone bandit early today robbed a North Portland department store of \$1500 within 800 feet of the St. Johns precinct police station.

tremendous, the red army still was attacking in force west of Rostov and in the Donets basin and German troops were reported fighting back in a defensive stand.

Reports from the front said Italian and Slovak units had been brought into the fight and declared that the Russians were being stopped.

A new note from the southern front came from the Crimea where dispatches said Russian troops were counter-attacking in an attempt to break out of the encircled Sevastopol naval base.

The high command said Russian attacks in the Donets basin had been repulsed.

(Whether the high command was referring to the Kharkov sector or the Rostov-Mariupol zone was not apparent. Russians maintained that the Germans were in full flight from Rostov and that red army troops held the initiative at Kharkov, more than 200 miles to the north.)

Bomb Blasts Home Of President of Lumber Company

DETROIT, Dec. 4 (AP)—The explosion of a black powder bomb early today blasted in the massive front door and shattered windows at the residence of Patrick J. Currier, president of the CIO-organized Currier Lumber company, in Detroit's fashionable northwest section.

Currier, who was in New York with his wife, declared the American Federation of Labor "are the only ones who could be responsible." He was recently refused a government contract to build pre-fabricated homes for a defense housing project at Wayne, Mich., although his bid was low by \$431,000.

Informed of Currier's accusation, President Frank X. Martel of the Detroit and Wayne County Federation of Labor said: "This is just another of Currier's lies."

At the Currier home when the bombing occurred were the lumberman's two daughters, Collette, 14, and Claire, 3, asleep in an upstairs bedroom; Michael O'Connor and Miss Madeleine O'Connor, brother and sister of Mrs. Currier, and May Williams, a domestic. None was injured.

Currier posted a \$1000 reward for capture of the perpetrators.

hours although "our forces continue their pressure on isolated enemy centers of resistance" in the Libyan-Egyptian frontier area.

Three Italian tanks were reported destroyed in one small engagement while on the main front, south of Tobruk small bodies of the axis forces, endeavoring to move forward the Sidi Azelz area, were engaged by British mobile columns.

The British, who now aim to whittle down the axis armored power in North Africa tank by tank, were said to have concentrated their main strength on an offensive line from El Gobi northward toward Rezegh, 10 miles below long-besieged Tobruk.

This line, it was said, will be the base of future operations against the divisions of German General Edwin Rommel and the British banished illusions of a quick victory.

(Stefani, official Italian news agency, reported from Rome that the British no longer have the impetus of the initial operations of the battle and said it was evident that "after so many days of fighting, both the wearing down of large forces of men and the increased difficulties of replenishing gasoline, munitions, food and other materials are making themselves felt.")

Five Killed in Head-on Crash

TULARE, Calif., Dec. 4 (AP)—Five persons, two of them soldiers, were killed and three soldiers were injured in what apparently was a head-on collision between two automobiles in southern Tulare county late yesterday.

The dead were identified as Corporal Francis Powell and Private Ellison D. Butler, 538 school squad, Mather field, Sacramento.

C. L. Bunker, Ella Bunker and Mrs. Larinda B. Acree, all of Claremont.

The injured soldiers were Privates William Smith, Samuel White and Ralph Young, also from Mather field.

Belgians Facing Punishment, Report

BERLIN, Dec. 4 (AP)—Sixty-one persons are facing the "strictest sort" of punishment by a court martial in connection with the dissolution of the Belgian national legion by German military authorities, it was learned here today.

The Brussels German language newspaper Brueissler Zeitung said ammunition, arms and large amounts of anti-German propaganda were found by German authorities in surprise raids on the legion which was founded immediately after the war.

The newspaper said it was supported by a large number of former Belgian officers who "owe their freedom to German generosity."

SILVERTON, Dec. 4 (AP)—A turkey dinner for 1000 has been undertaken by the Silverton unit of the AFL, which plans to fete employees of the local mill and their families Dec. 20.

Postal Receipts Show Slight Gain For Past Month

A slight gain in postal receipts for the month of November, 1941, over November, 1940, was reported by Postmaster Burt E. Hawkins. Receipts this past month totaled \$11,233.16, as compared to last year's figure of \$11,006.33. There was a gain this month of \$226.83.

The low figure for the month will not affect the quarterly figure as December makes up for it, Hawkins stated.

Crescent City Judge Selected Gable Successor

YREKA, Calif., Dec. 4 (AP)—Judge John Childs of Crescent City, Del Norte county, was selected today to head the movement to carve a 49th state out of parts of northern California and southern Oregon.

He succeeded Mayor Gilbert Gable of Port Orford, Curry county, Oregon, who died Tuesday. Gable launched the "secession movement," charging that the so-called "orphan counties" along the border had been neglected by their respective states.

Judge Childs, who was a close friend of Gable, was selected as his successor at a meeting of spokesmen from the several interested counties. He participated in the so-called "provisional territorial assembly" held here later in the day.

Members of the new "territorial cabinet" include O. G. Steele of Yreka and District Attorney Edwin J. Reagan of Trinity county.

Judge Childs has not decided what title he would assume.

time would, in my opinion, be disastrous," William H. Davis, chairman of the national defense mediation board, told several thousand manufacturers today.

Davis, addressing the 64th annual convention of the National Association of Manufacturers, which yesterday called for federal legislation against defense strikes, said: "I believe that labor organization must go on, not in spite of the emergency, but because of the emergency."

"For service in private industry," Davis said, "free men can not be drafted. In private industry, workers and management must be allowed to fix wages, hours and working conditions by agreement. This explains why the National Association of Manufacturers, as well as the great labor organizations, have passed resolutions against compulsory arbitration."
