

# SCHOOLS BUY LARGE AMOUNT OF STAMPS

A total of \$1073.65 worth of national defense savings stamps have been sold in Klamath Falls schools. It was announced Thursday. Regular sale dates have been established in all seven schools with one late starter holding daily sales in an effort to catch up.

Defense stamp sales began in late October when Riverside school started its drive for individual saving through the purchase of stamps. It holds its sales every week, on Mondays, sponsored by the PTA whose officers attend to purchase of the stamps and disposition of sale funds. The total sale of this school has amounted to \$132.45.

Roosevelt school started sales Thursday and set up a nice total of \$75. Sales there are under faculty supervision, with assistance of the PTA, while at Mills school the PTA has taken over sales and from a sale of \$137.50 worth of stamps the first day, has in three sale days sold a total of \$421.05. This school had the largest sale of any of the seven now selling stamps. It was Thursday and the amount was \$178.55.

Pelican school was late getting started and had held only one sale, with results amounting to \$13. Fremont school kicked off November 5 with a first sale of \$105.85, under supervision of the school faculty. They have held four sales, intending to continue every Monday, and the total of their sales is \$266.40.

Fairview school has sold \$106 worth of stamps since November 7 and intends to continue to have sale days every two weeks. Last time the demand so exceeded the supply that more could have been sold than the \$32 that the sponsoring PTA had on hand.

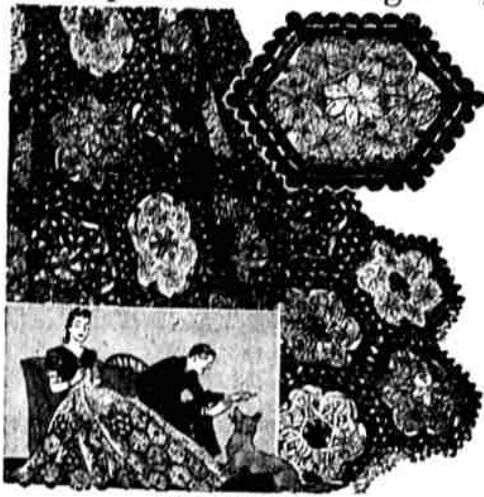
Conger's total to date is \$59.75 and this is the school that is having its sale booth open daily, before school is called, under the care of the PTA.

## 'I've Been Shot,' Says the Patient

FORT WORTH, Tex., Dec. 4 (AP)—D. M. Wood, 44, of Tolar, walked into the emergency room at St. Joseph's hospital today and announced calmly that he had been shot in the chest.

"I coughed up the bullet," Wood told attendants. "I didn't like the taste of lead."

A physician found the bullet had ranged upward from Wood's left breast—under the skin but outside the lung cavity—and into

his throat. It missed vital arteries and veins.

"This couldn't happen again in a million tries," the physician said.

Wood told attendants that he had driven alone to Fort Worth from his home at Tolar—45 miles.

He said he was shot when a .32 caliber pistol dropped from his belt while he was investigating a disturbance in his chicken house about 9 a. m.

The physician said Wood should be able to leave the hospital in "two or three days."

Mrs. Jones runs a house and a family. National defense has already touched her life in numerous ways. Most important, of course, is the fact that she now has a son in the army.

In a less important—but still serious way—Defense has touched her pocketbook. It seems to her that everything she buys today costs more than it did a few months ago. And yet the allowance on which she runs her house, feeds and clothes her family is just what it has been for some time.

Defense has touched her life outside her family, too. She has been faced with the problem of whether to go on spending her leisure at bridge tables, or whether to volunteer for instruction in some of the defense courses.

She's Doing Her Best

Mrs. Jones isn't going around wailing because "poor Dick" was taken into the army just when he was going good in a new job. She hasn't encouraged Dick to feel sorry for himself, either. Instead she has let him see that she is proud of him, and thinks what he is doing is important.

When he gets her letters at camp, he is more—rather than less—satisfied than he was before. He's not mama's-boy-who-had-a-tough-break and isn't it

a-shame? He's a man doing a man's duty.

The "high cost of living" hasn't got Mrs. Jones down either. She has had to start economizing pretty close—but she doesn't talk about it all the time. She doesn't ruin her family's meals by grimly reporting at the table that pork is up another two cents a pound.

And she hasn't once said to her husband, "I just don't see how I'm going to manage on my allowance." She's managing—with a minimum of talk and complaints.

And she has decided that she can't afford to waste all her leisure on women's bridge parties and aimless teas. So she is busy these days learning first aid, knitting, rolling bandages, and helping in a school hot lunch program.

In short, Mrs. Jones' morale is splendid. That is, she is making the best of the job she has to do.
