

Many People From Klamath Located In Pacific Isles

Concern was felt Monday by many Klamath people for the safety of relatives and friends in the Hawaiian, Philippine and other Pacific islands. A number of Klamath men are there as members of the armed forces, others are engaged in construction work or other defense activity.

The following items mention some, but not all, Klamath people or relatives of local people in the islands:

Dr. Denton John Rees, former Klamath Falls dentist, sailed last summer from San Francisco to be stationed in the Philippines with the United States medical corps.

Another former Klamath Falls youth, Lieut. Gordon Benson, is now stationed in the Philippines with the air corps. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Steve Benson, 807 Alameda street, and was graduated last April from Randolph field, Texas.

Wesley Slough, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward W. Slough of 2219 Etna street, is stationed in Pearl Harbor as electrician on one of Uncle Sam's large battleships. In a recent letter home, Wesley advised his parents they wouldn't "hear frequently" as his ship was seldom in port. He is a former News and Herald carrier boy.

Mrs. Charles M. Reynolds, 2110 White avenue, called The News and Herald office Monday morning seeking information on conditions in the islands. Mr. and Mrs. Reynolds' son Don, 24, is seaman first class on the USS Gamble, now in Pearl Harbor. His wife sailed from San Francisco, November 14 to join him.

Mrs. Reynolds' brother and family, Mr. and Mrs. Dewey Poulson, and their son and his family reside in Honolulu where Poulson is superintendent of the Honolulu Construction company.

Mrs. Alice M. Ormsby, 221 Spring street, employed in the banking of the J. C. Penney company, is anxious to hear word from her son, Sergeant John Cooksey of this city who is stationed at Clark field, the Philippines, with the heavy bombardment squadron of the United States air corps.

Mrs. Frank M. Huffman of the Marion apartments is particularly anxious to receive word from her young brother, Second Lieutenant Justin Woods, who received his "wings" just five weeks ago in Phoenix, Ariz., and sailed from San Francisco after taking the Mainliner from Medford following a visit with his people in McMinnville. Lieut. Woods is now stationed at Hickam field with the US air corps.

Tulelake friends are interested in the welfare of Dr. Stanley McNulty, now stationed with the United States medical corps in Guam. He is a former Tulelake dentist. Mrs. McNulty and her three children returned to this country in July and are now in San Francisco. One pair of twins was born after the McNultys left here. They are former residents of Yreka. Mrs. McNulty is the niece of E. G. Childers, 2115 Tunnel street, Klamath Falls.

Salem Editor Overhears Hint Of Jap Attack

SALEM, Dec. 8 (AP)—Stephen C. Mergler, managing editor of the Oregon Statesman, was one of the first persons to suspect Japan's attack on Hawaii yesterday.

Mergler, an amateur radio operator, was listening to a conversation between amateurs in Hawaii and Salt Lake City.

"This looks bad! I can't stay in this place," the Hawaiian said. "Can't talk any more. You take over."

When the Salt Lake operator asked what was the trouble, the Hawaiian replied: "I'm in the army and can't tell you."

Mergler then began to think about getting ready to put out an extra edition.

Crewmen to Be Trained for Big Output of Planes

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—The army announced intention today to train 10,000 bombardier-navigators within a year for the mounting number of long-range bombers rolling off assembly lines.

Secretary Stimson disclosed qualifications for recruits would be lowered to assure an adequate number of skilled crewmen. High school graduates who pass an air corps intelligence test will be accepted for 45 weeks of training, a longer period of specialized schooling than undergone by pilots who are to be trained at the rate of 30,000 a year.

Hitherto candidates were required to have two years of college education. The bombardier and navigation training is to be combined.

Stimson announced at his press conference two further moves to strengthen the ground forces, the creation of 52 "tank destroyer" battalions, and the conversion of two additional regular army triangular divisions into fully motorized units.

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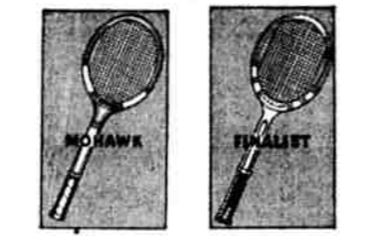

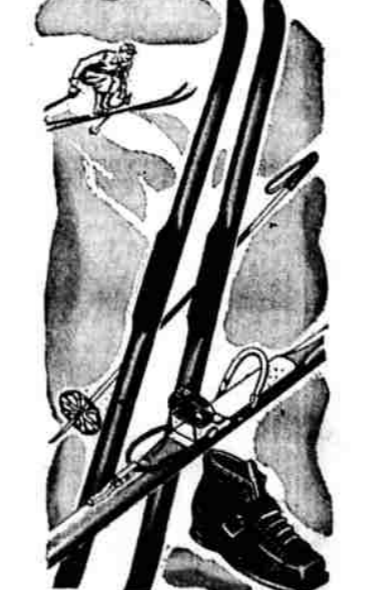
