Following lodge Monday night Mrs. Goldie Kidwell gave a brief history of the origin of the Odd Fellows home.

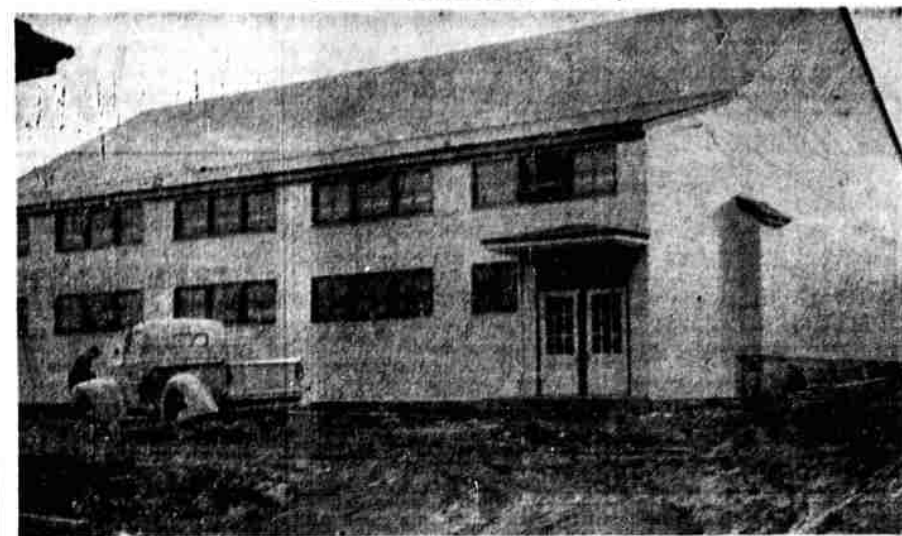

TRAFFIC SIGNALS AWAIT SHIPMENT

Traffic signals in the business district, an improvement the city of Klamath Falls has long hoped for, should go into effect this week but the exact date cannot be announced until the arrival of the "walk and wait" glass from Syracuse, N. Y., according to a check made Monday morning with City Engineer E. A. Thomas.

A wire from Syracuse advised the engineer the glasses had been shipped November 29, and should arrive Monday. A possible change in freight movements due to international developments may hold up the glasses. They will be installed immediately upon arrival and Trowbridge and Flynn, Medford contractors on the job, will then notify State Traffic Engineer John Beake of Salem, who plans to leave immediately for Klamath Falls to officially switch on the signals.

According to Thomas, the printed glasses, on which are printed the words, "walk" and "wait," go into the fixtures hanging on the side of the poles.
