FIRST LIST OF CASUALTIES IN HAWAII GIVEN

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9 (A)-The war department published the army's first official casualty list of the war today, making public the names of 37 army of ficers and men killed in action in the Japanese attack on Hawaii Six were commissioned officers, all of the air forces, and the others also were air corps men. The names were announced as
