Evans remains in Klamath Valley hospital where his condition was said to be satisfactory. He has broken ribs, facial cuts and is suffering from shock. Dr. Glascoe received bruises.

PARKS ALLOWED TIME TO PLEAD IN DAVID CASE

George Parks, accused in the Buffalo Lunch murder of Dr. Salem A. David, was arraigned in circuit court Tuesday morning and given until 11 a. m. December 11 to enter a plea.

Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg appointed U. S. Balentine and E. E. Driscoll to represent Parks, a dark, hook-nosed man brought here from Great Falls, Mont., to face the murder charge.

Parks, who said his real name was George Jonas, was indicted by the Klamath county grand jury in the notorious South Sixth street killing case. He is alleged by the state to be one of the bandits who invaded the lunch room last March, and killed Dr. David when he pursued them outside after an armed robbery.

The court at first appointed J. C. O'Neill as Parks' attorney, but O'Neill asked to be excused because he has served as attorney for Dr. Salem David, victim of the murder, and also for David's relatives.

Parks was returned to the Klamath county jail where he is held without bail.

Alfred Marion Richardson, 19.

entered a plea of not guilty in circuit court Tuesday morning. Richardson was indicted by the Klamath county grand jury on a charge of statutory rape.

Promoter of Inventions Dies

NEW YORK, Dec. 9 (AP)—Hart O. Berg, 76, engineer who developed the Browning pistol and machine gun in this country and sponsored the first public flights of the Wright brothers' airplane, died today at Doctors' hospital.

He was a native of Philadelphia but devoted most of his career to introducing to Europe products of American inventive genius.

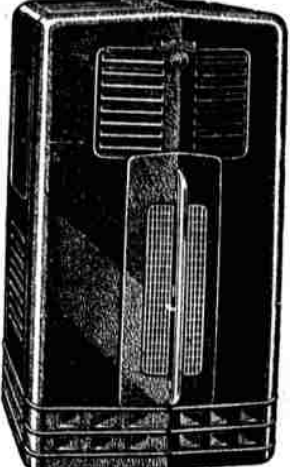
