

COUNCIL GETS POLICE, FIRE RESERVE BILLS

Emergency defense measures received major attention of the city council at last night's meeting.

The council passed through first and second readings ordinances creating police and fire reserves totaling up to 250 men. Both measures carried the emergency clause, pointing out that the United States is at war with Japan, and making possible final action next Monday night.

The police reserve would total up to 150 men, appointed by the police chief and mayor. The manpower reserve for the fire department would aggregate up to 100. The reserves would serve without compensation except as provided by the council.

Fire Chief Keith Ambrose informed the council he had ordered all firemen to remain in town, to be available 24 hours a day. He said also he had called a meeting for Tuesday night in the council chambers of the managers of all the major lumber industries here to discuss fire protective measures.

To Buy Siren

Chief Ambrose said that there is a reserve of \$3045 in the fire department's fund and asked for permission to buy a general fire alarm siren. The council approved this purchase.

There was discussion of the blowing of a laundry siren here and councilmen and fire chief agreed it should not be blown. The siren, it was said, is sometimes blown at 1 p. m., but not always. A siren, Chief Ambrose said, is an alarm for emergency measures, and should not function as a routine whistle.

The council refused Main street parking spaces by 20 from 8 a. m. to 1 p. m. through its action in establishing loading zones from Fourth to Twelfth streets on both sides of the street. There will be one zone for each block on each side of the street. The zones are two passenger car lengths long.

Mayor Houston questioned the police committee and Police Chief Frank Hamm at length about the proposal. He said he disliked to see passenger car parking spaces drastically reduced in this manner.

But the police committee chairman, Councilman Bussman, said the measure was necessary in order to make it possible for delivery trucks of all kinds to load and unload at business houses without double parking.

Chief Hamm and City Engineer E. A. Thomas approved, and the council adopted the proposal.

No Double Parking

Mayor Houston asked the street committee to make an immediate study of the use of curb space by service stations, funeral homes and other places of business.

City officials emphasized in the discussion that when the traffic signal system is placed in operation, it will be necessary to eliminate all double parking. Trucks will not be permitted to back into spaces for loading, but will use the loading zones.

These zones, from 1 p. m. on, will be open to the general public for parking.

The council adopted the liquor license ordinance decided upon a week ago.

A resolution from the Junior chamber of commerce approved the council's efforts to solve the snot problem in Klamath Falls. It was stated that sample ordinances covering this problem are to be studied.

At 9:18 a bell rang and the seniors, juniors and sophomores gathered in the auditorium of KUHHS. Before them on the stage was a small table model radio playing some tune or other. For 10 minutes the gathered students mumbled together about the war in general and the effect on the school and personal effects; then the music stopped at 9:30, and an announcer went through the formalities of introducing the president.

As the president began his short, historic message to congress the room became stilled and the students sat through the entire speech with little or no emotion. They applauded only once in the course of the program. This occurred at the point in Rep. Hamilton Fish's address when he said something about annihilating the Japanese devils.

Those who heard the speeches left the assembly in an unusually quiet mood and left immediately for their classes.

Radios were brought to school by many students and the event of the voting and results were soon known by all. Probably the rooms will find almost permanent radios in them if the present emergency continues for any length of time as it now appears it is going to do.

Some talk of enlisting was heard. The students seem to be of the opinion that they should finish their schooling in high school at least, unless it comes to the place where all male members of the population must fight to preserve our freedom and our land. Several have enlisted, it is rumored, however.

It has been heard from informative sources that in the near future, this week sometime, the students will be instructed in air raid precautions and so forth. This has not been confirmed by the office, but is very probable.

The war at present is not making much fuss with the running of the high school. The Boys' Alliance is still worrying about finances and might be glad to know that the carnival has made them happy once again. The alliance took in \$241 on their carnival last Friday night and about \$100 of it is profit.

As soon as all bills are paid the boys will have about \$75 in the bank.

The clubs are functioning as usual. The French club had a meeting Monday night. The Art club held an initiation for new members Tuesday.

KLAMATH FLYING UNIT TO BE FORMED

Hello Americans! Lawrence Slater, exalted ruler of Klamath Falls lodge of Elks, through his national defense committee, and in keeping with the grand lodge program of "Keep 'Em Flying," has set a quota of 20 young men between the ages of 20 and 26 inclusive, to be known as Klamath Falls' own flying unit.

Men who have had two years of college or a completed high school education are eligible for enrollment in the army air corps as flying cadets. High school graduates are offered a refresher course in the subjects necessary to pass the educational examinations, which will be held at a later date. This course will be given without cost to the applicant through the cooperation of Klamath Union high school.

This is an excellent opportunity for patriotic young Americans to serve their country and in addition obtain training which will lead to a successful and interesting career throughout life. Completion of the course of training will guarantee the applicant a commission as second lieutenant in the army air corps reserve with the monthly pay of \$245. RESOLUTION OF WAR ADOPTED BY CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—The text of the joint resolution adopted by congress today declaring war on Japan follows: Declaring that a state of war exists between the imperial government of Japan and the government and the people of the
