the oceans, are now considered by the axis strategists as one gigantic battlefield.

In a nationwide radio report to the nation on the first 36 hours of the war with Japan, the president said the United States is in the conflict "all the way."

"So far, the news has all been to the bad," he said. But he declared "we are going to win the war and we are going to win the peace that follows."

The casualty lists of these first few days, he warned, undoubtedly will be large.

He said he did not have sufficient information to state the exact damage inflicted by the Japanese dive bombers in the Sunday dawn attack at Pearl harbor, but he admitted it was serious.

Live in Freedom, Decency
"Many American soldiers and sailors have been killed," he said. "American ships have been sunk. American airplanes have been destroyed."

"Together with other free peoples we are now fighting to maintain our right to live among our world neighbors in freedom and common decency, without fear of assault."

He denounced as an "old trick of propaganda" rumors that U. S. fleet losses in the Pa-

Grangers to Discuss U. S. Defense at Meeting Here

Panel discussions laying special emphasis on the part of the Oregon State grange in civilian defense will be the feature of the annual State grange conference, beginning at 1:45 Thursday afternoon in the Midland grange hall.

Program for the meeting, which is for all Klamath county granges, includes a potluck dinner at 6 p. m., followed by separate meetings of the principal civic have given the Japanese naval supremacy.

"The purposes of such fantastic claims," he declared, "are to spread fear and confusion among us, and to goad us into revealing military information."

"Our government will not be caught in this obvious trap—and neither will our people."

But, he continued, the people must be prepared to accept news that its Pacific outposts at Guam, Wake and the Midway islands have fallen to the Japanese.

"Our forces in the Philippines are taking punishment but are defending themselves vigorously," he added.

Shame Wiped Out
Then he warned that the attack on Pearl harbor "can be repeated at any one of many points in both oceans and along both our coastlines and against all the rest of the hemisphere."

Germany and Italy, regardless of any formal declaration of war, consider themselves at war with the United States now just as much as they consider themselves at war with Russia and Britain, he added.

"The United States can accept no result save victory, final and complete," he said. "Not only must the shame of Japanese treachery be wiped out, but the sources of international brutality, wherever they exist, must be absolutely and finally broken."

He said the "sudden criminal" attacks by the Japanese in the Pacific climaxed a decade of international immorality in which powerful and resourceful gangsters have banded to make war upon the whole human race.

"Their challenge has now been flung at the United States... the congress and the people have accepted that challenge," he said.

He disclosed that this government had known for weeks that Germany had been telling Japan that if she did not attack the United States she would not share in dividing the spoils with Germany when peace came. He said Germany promised Japan that if she entered the war she would receive complete and perpetual control of the whole of the Pacific area.

That, he said, meant that Japan would reign not only over the Far East and over the islands of the Pacific, but also would have a strangle hold on the west coast of North and Central America.

Strategy Must Be Followed
He said, too, that this government knows Germany and Japan are conducting their military and naval operations in accordance with a general plan. That plan, he asserted, considers "all peoples and nations which are not helping the axis powers as common enemies of each and every one of the axis powers."

A similar grand plan of strategy by Americans must be followed, he declared, and production of defense weapons must be stepped up as an essential part of the plan.

Lend-lease aid to nations battling aggression will be continued, he pledged.

A seven-day work week will be imposed on all war industries and a plant expansion program will be initiated immediately to yield a new flood of war weapons.

New and higher taxes may be necessary, he indicated, saying the people must pay for a large cost of the war while it is in progress. He predicted they would do so cheerfully.

Now in the War
"It will not only be a long war, it will be a hard war," he said. "That is the basis on which we now lay all our plans. That is the yardstick by which we measure what we shall need and demand: money, materials, doubled and quadrupled production—ever increasing."

"The production must be not only for our own army and navy and air forces, it must reinforce the other armies and navies and air forces fighting the nazis and war lord of Japan throughout the Americas and the world."

"We are now in this war. We are all in it—all the way. Every single man, woman and child is a partner in the most tremendous undertaking of our American history."

We must share together the bad news and the good news, the defeats and the victories—the changing fortunes of war."

The United States must abandon the "illusion" of isolationism, he declared.

"In these past few years—and, most violently, in the past few days—we have learned a terrible lesson," he continued.

"It is our obligation to the dead—it is our sacred obligation to their children and our children—that we must never forget what we have learned."

"And what we have learned is this:

"There is no such thing as security for any nation—or any individual—in a world ruled by the principles of gangsterism."

"There is no such thing as impregnable defense against powerful aggressors who sneak up in the dark and strike without warning."

He acknowledged that Japan, with its surprise assault in the Pacific had performed a "brilliant feat of deception, perfectly timed and executed with great skill." It was a dishonorable deed, he said, but we must face the fact that modern warfare as conducted by the nazis "is a dirty business."

"We don't like it—we didn't want to get into it—but we are in it and we're going to fight it with everything we've got," he said grimly.

No American doubts "our ability to administer proper punishment to the perpetrators of these crimes," he added.

signal, signifying the approach of enemy planes. For slightly more than an hour the alarm continued, then sirens sounded an all-clear.

Windows were reported broken along downtown streets by citizens seeking to get at switches in stores where lights still burned despite the blackout.

Other northern California cities were blacked out at approximately the same time; Oakland, Berkeley and other bay area cities and Sacramento.

The blackout here was considerably more thorough than that of Monday night, when illuminated shop signs still glowed after the blackout was ordered.

Stung by an army general's reprimand, San Francisco has dropped its easy-going ways and had begun to learn how to respond to air raid warnings. (Details on page 4).

SEATTLE, Dec. 10 (AP)—Another crowd—this one estimated at around 300 persons, milled around Third and Fourth and Pike streets, the city's business intersections, early today after the start of Seattle's second blackout which began at 12:30 a. m.

Today's crowd was much more orderly than the mob of 1000 which Monday night smashed windows and looted stores for an hour before being broken up.

A larger force of police was on hand early today. One officer characterized today's crowd as "probably just curiosity seekers wondering if hell's going to break loose again."

PRINCE WALES, REPULSE LOST IN SEA FIGHT

house which I thought I should impart to them at the earliest possible moment," he declared. "The report has been received from Singapore that HMS Prince of Wales and HMS Repulse have been sunk while carrying out operations against a Japanese attack upon Malaya."

No Details

"No details are yet available except those contained in a Japanese official communique which claims both ships were sunk by an air attack."

"I shall take occasion at an early date to make a short statement of the general war situation which has, from many points of view, both favorably and adversely undergone important changes in the last few days."

The Prince of Wales, only recently dispatched to the Pacific, was the flagship of the fleet Britain had amassed and organized to defend the empire in the Far East.

She was especially armored against air attack.

With the Prince of Wales and Repulse lost Britain still had at least 19 battleships afloat or building.

Battleships now in service are five of the 30,000-ton Queen Elizabeth class built during the last war; four of the 29,000-ton royal sovereign class; the Nelson and Rodney of 33,000 tons commissioned in 1927, and the battle cruiser Renown of 32,000 tons, the only one of three of this type in commission at the start of the war.

The Prince of Wales was one of five ships of the King George V class all of which were scheduled for completion in 1941.

The King George V itself is known to be in service.

command announced, through KIRO, its information station: "It is advisable to make all possible arrangements for much earlier blackouts in the future."

The blackouts extend from British Columbia to Roseburg, Ore.

Elaborating on his announcement of a third successive night blackout, General Wash said:

"It is probable that in the near future the length of the blackout period will be shortened. This does not mean tomorrow or the next day."

He did not say whether that meant the possibility of a Japanese attack on the north Pacific coast had been reduced. He said yesterday reports indicated such an attack was imminent.

landing operations at Vigan amid bombing by American planes which capsized one transport and damaged two of five others.

A second communique at 4:30 p. m. (3:45 a. m., EST) said no further landings had been made and that "the situation in northern Luzon remains the same."

Manila Raided

While the battle in the north still raged, two waves of Japanese bombers raided Manila and its suburbs shortly after noon, hitting hard at military centers including the Nichols air depot, Fort William McKinley and Nielson airport districts.

The port of Iba and Clark airfield were reported unofficially to have been bombed at the same time.

Philippine constabulary reported the parachutist capture of Vigan, only 200 miles northwest of Manila.

In Action

American and Filipino troops went into action immediately against the invaders.

The US army headquarters announced that the enemy was "in heavy force off the northern coast of Luzon, extending from Vigan to Aparri" and had landed at Aparri and perhaps at several contiguous points.

Six Japanese transports escorted by "large Japanese naval elements" were engaged in landing operations off Vigan about 7:30 a. m., the communique said. Three were hit, one capsized, and bombs hit close to three others.
