

NUTRITIONISTS SPREAD WORK OVER KLAMATH

About 750 families of the approximately 10,000 in Klamath county have been already reached with nutrition information and some training through the organized efforts of the Klamath County Nutrition committee of the defense council, which has been functioning since its first meeting in August.

Organized to take over the task of improving the health of the American people and of avoiding waste of food in these times of some shortages, the work of the local committee stemmed from the Washington, D. C. meeting of the National Nutrition council in May. The local council has held five meetings since its organization. Members are Arnold L. Gralapp, Dr. P. H. Rozendal, Mrs. Dorothy Huffman, C. A. These are representatives of schools, the Red Cross, Public Health association, 4-H work, County Health unit, the W. P. A. county welfare and other agencies. Under these members are organized committees and sub-committees all of which are in part responsible for the work already done. Meetings are usually held in the chamber of commerce director's room.

Perhaps the largest number of families so far contacted has been through the existing fourteen home demonstration units of the county program, which were already set up. Two

women from each were brought to Klamath Falls for a training session and returned to carry with them to their communities the nutrition news which they had been given here. Extensive material on this subject was available largely due to the fact that the state home demonstration leader, Mrs. Azalea Sanger, had anticipated the need last spring before hostilities seemed so imminent, and had prepared bulletins for the need. In order to reach as many people outside the home demonstration units as possible, cards were prepared, pledging the singers to contact ten homemakers, and were distributed at the unit meetings. A very fine response has been received from these cards, according to the local

GARBER ORCHESTRA HERE DECEMBER 17

Again bringing the people of the Klamath basin a "scoop" in musical entertainment, the junior chamber of commerce are sponsoring the famous dance band of Jan Garber for Wednesday, December 17th in a pre-holiday dance at the local armory.

"Genial Jan" is a well known figure in the musical world, both in the modern swing arrangements and that of the finer musical art of the classical. While still in his teens, he was a featured soloist with the Philadelphia symphony orchestra, being already destined to be a concert violinist. The World War I saved him from a classical career, however, he was one of the first to enlist and despite his youth, he was made conductor of a 56-piece orchestra on the strength of his extensive classical training. After getting out of the service, Garber started up an orchestra of his own and a relic of his concert days still remains with him.

Having the inside track on the musical trends of the times, Garber has always adjusted his style of music to the type in demand and has been a long time favorite from coast to coast. Having started with "hotcha," moved to "jazz," and then gone to "sweet swing," proves that the maestro has a keen sense of what the public demands. This constant bobbing with the tide are all instances of the showmanship that has proven Garber to be a leader in his chosen field. His title of "Idol of the Air Lanes," has been given him through the presentations that he has given from hotels, night clubs and dance floors of the nation and broadcast.

WARNING GIVEN ON CUTTING GREENERY

Cutting your own Christmas tree or gathering greens for your holiday wreath may result in arrest on a misdemeanor charge.

It is against the law to remove growth from both state and federal forests and parks and from public roadways. A permit from the owner is required to cut trees or shrubs on private property, and from the US forest service, located in room 217 at the post-office building, to cut your tree on national forest lands.

State police pointed out that arrest on a misdemeanor charge carries a possible fine or imprisonment.

Navy Bureaus on 7-Day Schedule

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP) A seven-day week for the bureaus and offices of the navy department was ordered today by Undersecretary of the Navy James Forrestal.

He said there was a necessity for "taking all steps possible" to speed procurement of materials and directed that all bureaus and offices "should have sufficient force of personnel to work as many hours each day of the week, including Saturdays and Sundays, as is essential to obtain the objective."

DEFENSE BONDS BRING \$10,700 IN DRIVE HERE

An indication of the wholehearted steady effort of Klamath county citizens to bring to the attention of the general public the desirability and the patriotic duty of the purchase of defense bonds, is shown in the partially completed report made available by Chairman Myrtle C. Adams of the Southern Oregon Life Underwriters association committee with a total to date of \$10,700 sold.

This committee, consisting of Annabelle Newton and Martin Swanson in addition to the chairman, has been working under the supervision of Vern Owens of the salary savings group of the county defense savings committee, has made an employee solicitation of 10 of the city's mercantile and industrial establishments with a total sales report of 239 bonds, which were taken in addition to 44 bonds previously purchased by these employees.

Four hundred and sixty-two persons have been interviewed thus far and the work is being steadily continued. A splendid spirit on the part of prospects interviewed, is reported by all solicitors, a large number reporting that they have been setting aside portions of the savings for some time past, to invest in this way. Members of the underwriters committee who have been working under Adams' chairmanship are James Patterson, Paul Winter, Forrest Losee, Orval Provost, Annabelle Newton, Thomas O'Brien, Martin Swanson, Lynn Roycroft, Ben Gibson and George Sample.

The work of the underwriters was reported to Andrew M. Collier, county defense savings chairman, who praised the insurance men for their efforts.

The first dispensary in this country devoted exclusively to the treatment of the tuberculosis poor was opened in 1904 in New York City.



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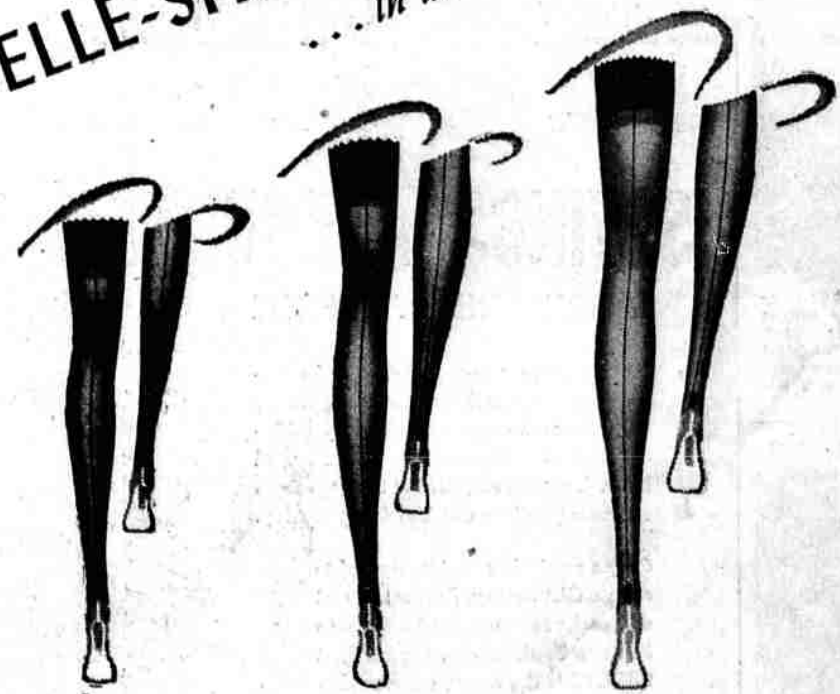
