STOCK MARKET HEADS UPWARD AS WAR VOTED

NEW YORK, Dec. 11 (AP)—Financial markets swung upward today as the Nazi-Italian coalition declared war on the United States and congress quickly called the bet with a unanimous vote to smash the axis by air, land and sea.

Transfers lacked the volume of the previous session and approximated 1,300,000 shares, the first time this week the turnover had been under 2,000,000 shares.

Commodities were strong, with some agricultural staples hitting the upper limits permitted in a single day's transactions. Rail bonds came back. Trading was suspended in dollar loans of Italy and Germany.

Prominent stocks on the move included US Steel, Bethlehem, Youngtown Sheet, Anaconda, Kennecott, Phelps Dodge, Boeing, Douglas Aircraft, United Aircraft, Dow Chemical, Dupont, Eastman Kodak, Union Carbide, Westinghouse, J. I. Case, International Harvester, N. Y. Central, Southern Pacific and Woolworth.

American Telephone dipped to a new 1941 low but eventually recovered for a net advance of around 4. Incline to lag were General Motors, Chrysler, Montgomery Ward and Goodrich.

WHEAT SHOOTS TO FOUR-YEAR PEAK

CHICAGO, Dec. 11 (AP)—Wheat prices shot up almost 5 cents a bushel today to peaks since 1937.

Although American-axis declarations of war were received calmly in the grain pits at first, buying enthusiasm expanded after mid-session and prices of all cereals soared to top levels for the past two months and, in some cases, for the past four years.

Buying of wheat was attributed to mills and other consuming interests as well as investors and professional traders. Washington reports that price control legislation may be delayed at least until next week.

Late profit taking reduced the wheat gain but prices closed 2 1/2 cents higher than yesterday, December \$1.26 1/2, May \$1.29 1/2-1.30. Corn was 1 1/2c up, December 79c, May 84 1/2c; oats 1 1/2c up; rye 2 1/2c up; soybeans 6 cents higher.
