

VOLUNTEERS ON LIST TO FIGHT KLAMATH FIRES

A second response from Fire Chief Keith K. Ambrose, calling for volunteers to make up an emergency fire squad within the city, was met with an overwhelming manner, according to Ambrose late Thursday afternoon when 88 additional men filed their applications for emergency work. A total of 113 names are now on the list and although Ambrose called for a maximum of 100, all of those who have signed up thus far will be given appointments.

the ships' mortal wounds, they said.

At least seven Japanese planes were shot down, the survivors said, before the commanders ordered the men over the sides of the sinking ships.

The men clung to life aboard rafts, floats and lifeboats until the destroyers raced in for the rescue. One crew man said Japanese planes hung overhead during the first part of the rescue work, but did not machine-gun the struggling survivors.

SINGAPORE, Dec. 11 (P)—Admiral Sir Tom Phillips, commander of Britain's Far Eastern fleet, and Captain John Leach, commander of the Prince of Wales, both are missing from the sunken battleship, said Captain W. G. Tennant, commander of the battle cruiser Repulse, and Captain L. H. Bell, captain of the fleet, are safe, it was announced officially tonight.

Official Blackout Bulletin

In event that it becomes necessary to have a blackout in Klamath county the warning will be given by a series of two short blasts on railroad and mill whistles. There will be no signal given by lights.

When this whistle signal is heard all persons should remain where they are and turn out all lights. If you are driving an automobile pull over to the curb and turn out your lights.

Persons having lighted shop windows or lighted industrial plants should make arrangements for the extinguishing of those lights. Adequate provision should also be made for the turning off of lights on all illuminated signs.

Keep cool. Keep off the streets and if you must move from where you are, go at a walk.

Do not call the police station, fire station or the sheriff's office except in the event of actual necessity. These telephone lines will be needed for official calls.

Once the alarm has been given all lights are to remain off until an all clear signal of one long blast on the whistles is given.

Klamath Air Raid Wardens Named; Districts Outlined

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Thursday night meeting of merchants and industrialists held at the Klamath Furniture company store.

He said the spirit of cooperation was 100 per cent among those in attendance, and all others, whether or not contacted, were urged to join in an all-out effort to black out completely business and industrial plants when a blackout signal is given.

This signal is a series of short blasts on the Southern Pacific whistle and mill whistles throughout the area.

Hugh Campbell of Weyerhaeuser agreed to cover the mills and arrange for blacking out plants and yards. Business men will take care of the downtown and outlying business districts.

Billboard operators were asked to eliminate lighting of these boards unless they can be turned out on a moment's notice.

Every business house was asked to make arrangements immediately for extinguishing all lights at the warning signal.

"If any one is not visited with instructions along this line, we urge that he act as if he had been contacted. The simple problem is this: Put out all of the lights, inside and out," said Proebstel.

Proebstel said there is no objection to outdoor Christmas lighting if arrangements are made to black it out immediately if the warning signal is given.

The entire county defense program is now centralized in the coordinator's office, which is the chamber of commerce offices opposite the courthouse on Main street. All information will clear through that office.

It was explained that the enforcement of blackout regulations will be handled by the civil authorities — city police, sheriff's office and state police.

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kin (R-Mont.), who cast the lone vote against war with Japan and who voted against war with Germany in 1917.

Just before the ballot, senators listened to a message from President Roosevelt asking the war declaration and saying that "never before has there been a greater challenge to life, liberty and civilization."

Senate galleries were only partly filled during the momentous action. Lord Halifax, the British ambassador, and Lady Halifax sat in the diplomatic galleries with other representatives of the diplomatic corps.

McNary's Pledge

Minority Leader McNary (R-Ore.) submitted a unanimous resolution of republican members pledging support to the president in prosecuting the war to a successful conclusion.

At the other end of the Capitol, jammed galleries and a crowded floor waited for the representatives to follow the lead of their senatorial colleagues.

The Rev. James Shera Montgomery, the house chaplain, opened the session with an appeal for divine aid for the nation.

In a brief, six-paragraph message to congress, which followed declarations of war on this country by the two axis partners, Mr. Roosevelt asserted that "the forces endeavoring to enslave the entire world now are moving towards this hemisphere."

Declaring that delay invites greater danger, Mr. Roosevelt added that "rapid and united effort by all of the peoples of the world who are determined to remain free will ensure a world victory of the forces of justice and of righteousness over the forces of savagery and barbarism."

There was no definite indication whether it was intended as such, but this sentence appeared to bear the implications of an appeal to Latin American neighbors to join in the victory effort.

The chief executive asserted that Germany's declaration of war was in pursuit of "its course of world conquest."

Not until the next to last sentence of his message did he mention that Italy, too, had declared war against the United States.

The text of the message: "On the morning of December 11, the government of Germany, pursuing its course of world conquest, declared war against the United States."

"The long-known and the long-expected has thus taken place. The forces endeavoring to enslave the entire world now are moving toward this hemisphere."

"Never before has there been a greater challenge to life, liberty and civilization."

"Delay invites great danger. Rapid and united effort by all of the peoples of the world who are determined to remain free will insure a world victory of the forces of justice and of righteousness over the forces of savagery and of barbarism."

"Italy also has declared war against the United States."

"I therefore request the congress to recognize a state of war between the United States and Germany, and between the United States and Italy."

boats in a Japanese air attack on the Hong Kong coast yesterday also were announced by the navy.

An army recapitulation of planes destroyed since Monday on the Malayan air front, a British zone of operations, listed 88, including 30 shot down in the air. Of these, it said, five were United States-built Brewster Buffalo fighter planes.

The Japanese said 25 of their nationals were found interned in Guam and were released while the landing force still continued "mopping up operations."

A navy communiqué said a 3000-ton United States tanker was captured in the Guam attack.

It declared that the Japanese, striking by sea from all sides of the island, gained their first foothold at dawn yesterday, when a naval landing party reached shore at Port Apra, on the west coast of the island, 1500 airline miles east of Manila. The port is little more than five miles from Agana, the capital.
