



NUTRITION ADVICE FOR WORKERS EYED

"Better Family Living for National Defense," is the name of a booklet put out by the extension service of Oregon State col-lege and distributed here in a campaign sponsored locally by the nutrition committee of the Klamath defense council, for better nutrition of American families in the struggle ahead. If the mother of the family

works, as many do, and thus can-not attend the afternoon meetings of extension units, clubs and other groups to which better nutrition is being preached, a solu tion has been found by Mrs. Su-zanne Hamilton of the Penney store.

Hearing the gospel of better nutrition at a meeting of the BPW, at which Mrs. Winnifred Gillen, a member of the nutrition committee and Klamath demonstration home agent, material, spoke, she gathered took notes and went before a gathering of the store force prepared to make a plea for their help.
