

### Local AFL Labor Council Pledges Support in Crisis

The AFL Central Labor Council of Klamath Falls Thursday pledged its wholehearted support in the national crisis to Mayor John Houston and all civic defense organizations.

In a message signed by President Art Lind, Secretary Treasurer Buell Orrell, and Trustees G. C. Tatman, A. L. Barker and Joe Willis, the council said that "the situation that has come about as a result of the ambitions of the Japanese government will demand of every citizen the best that he can give, and we pledge such an effort in the name of all our 23 affiliated local unions."

The council in a meeting Thursday also adopted a resolution previously drawn and adopted by the northwest council of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers union which affirmed support of President Roosevelt, urged calm, and recommended the setting up of anti-sabotage squads among local unions.

The resolution follows: WHEREAS, the evil forces of aggression which have already subjugated a major portion of the civilized world on Sunday, December 7, included the United States among the victims of unwarranted attack, and

WHEREAS, the Japanese navy on that date, without warning or notification, attacked Hawaii, Manila, Guam, and other United States possessions, killing hundreds of American citizens, both in and out of the armed forces, and

WHEREAS, this brutal attack was made at the very time when Japanese envoys were carrying on peace negotiations in Washington with President Roosevelt and his cabinet, and

WHEREAS, the die is now cast and America is once more being called in to defend its honor, its democracy, and its very life, and

WHEREAS, the need of the hour is for national calmness, national unity, national patriotism, and maximum production of vital materials of all kinds, now

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Northwestern Council of Lumber and Sawmill Workers, chartered by the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, and affiliated with the American Federation of Labor, assembled in convention in Portland, Ore., December 8, 1941, go on record as wholeheartedly supporting the administration's foreign policy, and President Roosevelt, who has done his utmost to keep the United States out of war, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, all local unions and affiliated

members be urged to remain calm and collected in the face of the national emergency, and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all affiliated locals be urged to immediately set up anti-sabotage squads in all operations under their jurisdiction to prevent any serious sabotage in any of the northwest lumber operations, which will of necessity be called upon to play a vital part in winning the war which has been forced upon America and its citizens.
