

NAVAL OFFICE BUSY SPOT AS BOYS LINE UP

Busiest place in town Wednesday was a room on the second floor of the federal building where boys, just barely 17, and men fast approaching 50, were lined up hoping to serve their country in time of stress. The room is headquarters for the Klamath Falls navy recruiting depot and the two officers in charge, Chief Gunners Mate Frank J. McDonald, and Chief Gunners Mate J. G. Lea, are working 15 to 16 hours a day interviewing men, giving them their preliminary physical exams, and finally, putting them on the northbound train for Portland where they will complete their examinations and be sent south to San Diego for the training period.

Rejected men are more than "dejected," the recruiting officers stated. Many of the men are reenlisting in the navy but the surprising feature of the list is the number of 17-year-olds who are anxious to get in the fight.

Good Neighbors Noted for Elegant Buffet Suppers

Our Latin American good neighbors give rather elegant evening parties.

Latin America is much in the news these days. For your next party, why not serve a supper with good neighbor accent? Rich salads, ices and sweets are important. They often serve pineapple ice in tall sherbet cups with a ring of flower petals under each stem. That's a novel and beautiful hint for our hostesses.

Latin American Buffet Supper Menu

Avocado canapes, anchovy canapes, mayonnaise of flounder with shrimp, pineapple ice, cookies, coffee, panocha.

Mayonnaise of Flounder And Shrimp

(Serves 4 to 6)

One pound poached fillets of flounder, 1 pound cooked shrimp or 2 cans shrimp, juice 2 large lemons, 1 teaspoon minced basil or tarragon (optional), sliced tomatoes, iceberg lettuce, thick mayonnaise, 1 small bottle stuffed olives, halved hard boiled eggs, rolled anchovies.

Poach the fish by simmering 10 minutes in salted water containing 1 tablespoon of lemon juice; then drain, sprinkle with lemon juice and herbs, cool and cut in halves.

Chop half the shrimp; add lemon juice and herbs, then chill. Blend with mayonnaise.

and add a little finely shredded lettuce. Put the flounder on a platter. Top each piece smoothly with shrimp salad, and cover with mayonnaise. Decorate each portion with an olive. Surround with the hard cooked eggs topped with mayonnaise and an anchovy, slices of tomato and border of finely shredded lettuce and parsley.

Panocha

Three cups dark brown sugar, 1 cup milk, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 13 cups nuts chopped coarse. Combine the sugar, milk and butter. Cook and stir over a low heat until a little of the mixture when dropped in cold water forms a soft ball. Add the vanilla and nuts, and beat until it begins to stiffen. Drop by small tablespoons onto waxed or lightly buttered paper. Walnuts, pecans or blanched Brazil nuts may be used in making this candy; and a square of shaved bitter chocolate may be cooked with the sugar and milk.
