Deliver Ball in One Slow and Unbroken Four-Step Approach for Easy Rhythm

Stand from 9 to 15 feet back of the foul line, depending upon the length of your stride and the number of steps you plan to take before delivery.

I recommend a four-step approach. It gives you an easy

rhythm, does not put too much strain on your arm as does the three-step approach. Beginners may get tied up and confused

using the long five-step approach.

If you are a right-handed bowler and plan to take four steps before delivery, you start with your right foot and finish on your

Beginners often get out of step and wind up on their right instead of left foot. The result is an awkward, off-balance de-livery which produces nothing but headaches.

Footwork is important to a smooth, well-coordinated delivery.

The body should be fairly erect, shoulders square at the pins, weight evenly distributed. The ball should rest squarely in the left hand. It should be held somewhere in the belt-shoulder zone. The "V" between the thumb and index finger should point directly at the head pin.
