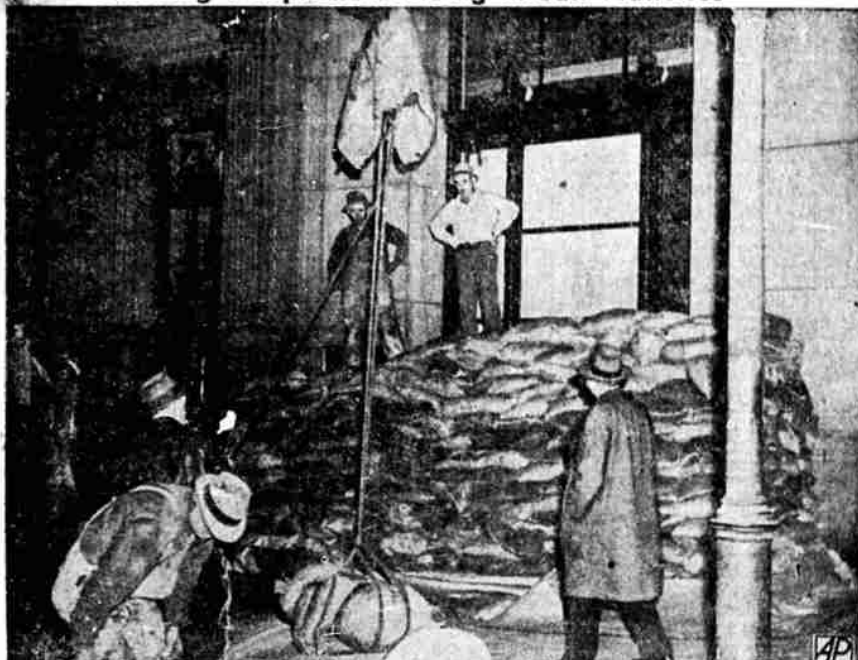
Air view of Manila shows point where Pasig river enters Manila bay. On the peninsula is Fort Santiago, the headquarters for the military forces in the archipelago.

**Sandbag Telephone Building in San Francisco**

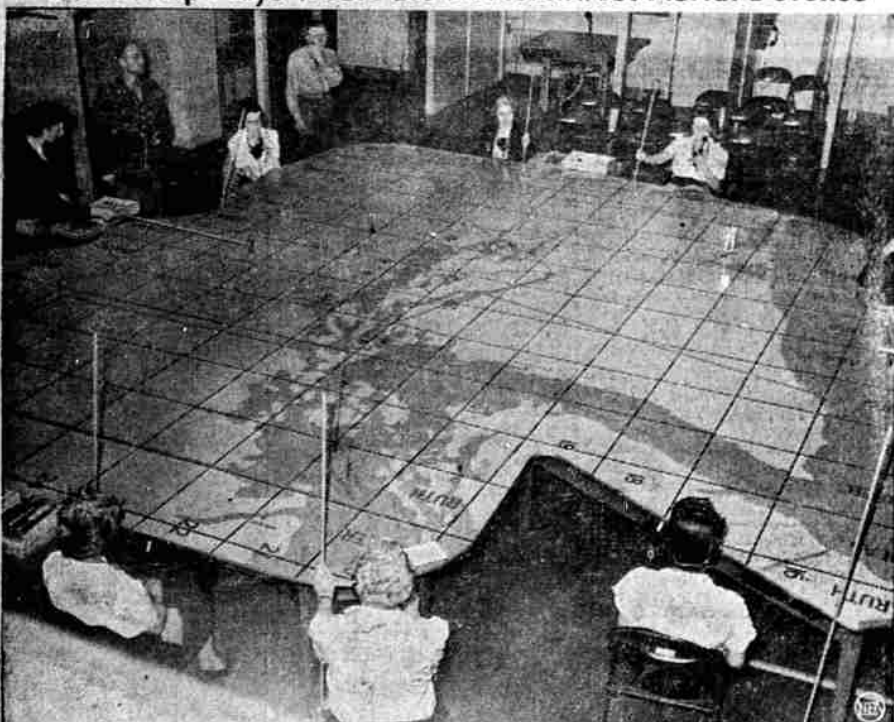


Workmen were busy in San Francisco raising a barricade of 3000 sandbags around the long distance building of the telephone company as a protection against possible bomb damage.

**Honored on Retirement**



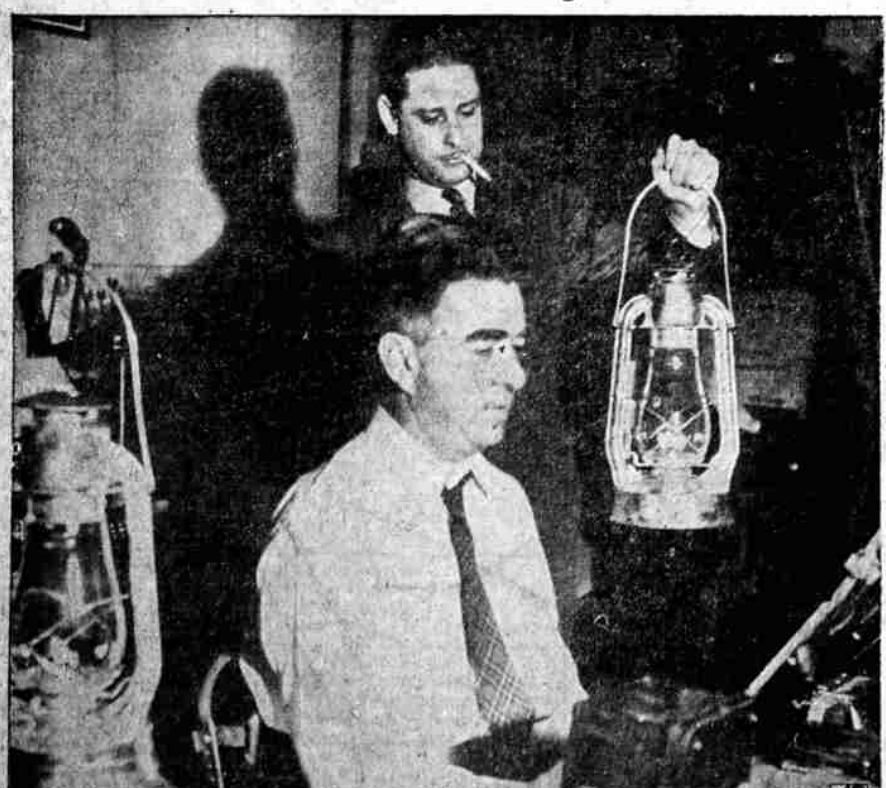

**AP Bureau Uses Lanterns During Blackout**



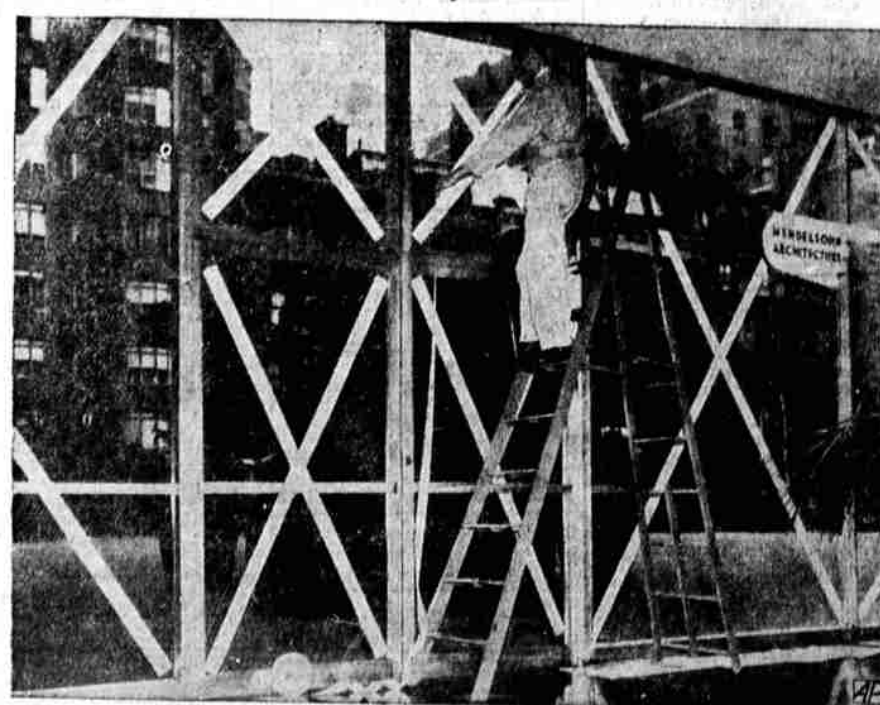
