INDIAN TRAPPERS GIVEN WARNING

SPRAGUE RIVER—The many Indians in Sprague River area, who are engaged in trapping muskrats and other fur bearing animals, have been warned that all traps must be stamped with some identification marks or they will be subject to confiscation by the reservation game warden.

At the meeting of the business committee of the Klamath reservation held at the agency office recently it was suggested effective December 20, 1941 all traps must be marked or they will be picked up and confiscated by the game warden of the area. Sylvan Crume is the

warden for the Sprague River region. It was shown at the meeting that stamps or dies for marking such equipment would cost only about 30 cents apiece and no excises would be accepted for non-compliance. Muskrat trapping has proved to be a very profitable business on the meandering stretches of the Sprague River with its many marshes. The Indian treaty provides that only Indians are permitted to trap on the tribal lands. This new restriction is very important to the locals because there are a large number of Indians engaged in the trapping business and the loss of traps is a severe blow. It is hoped that this change will be followed.
