ARMS STOCKS TAKE FURTHER UPWARD TILT

NEW YORK, Dec. 16 (AP)—Stocks with an armament rating made further recovery headway in the early part of today's market but the majority eventually wavered.

Gains of fractions to a point or so for favored steels, coppers, aircrafts, oils and specialties were well sold or specialized into declines at the close. Weakness of motors and mail orders, combined with softness of rubbers and some other leaders tended to stem the forward swing elsewhere.

Large blocks of low-priced issues helped put the day's volume at around 1,200,000 shares. It was the severest consecutive full session in which transfers exceeded the million figure. International telephone came out in one sale of 20,400 shares. Offic at 14c at a new year's boom.

GRAIN PRICES UP BY BIDDING SLOW

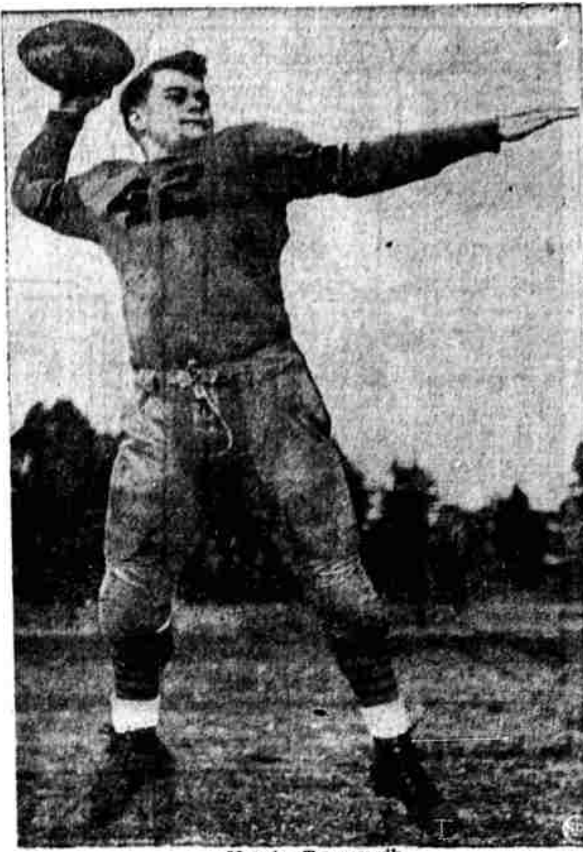
CHICAGO, Dec. 16 (AP)—Market activity began to slow down as demand softened today, despite a sharply higher opening for all grain futures. As demand slackened, prices weakened and extreme gains in many cases were reduced by half, or more.

Uncertainty over pending price control legislation caused many traders to adopt a cautious attitude and withdraw to the sidelines. At the day's best wheat futures advanced as much as 1 1/2c, largely in sympathy with a 4c cent jump in soybeans, but at closing time prices of most commodities were only fractionally above the previous closing levels.

Another unsettling factor was a report that the government was formulating a policy on sales of federally owned wheat stocks. Wheat closed 1/2c to 1 cent higher than yesterday, December 16, 1941, May 1942; corn advanced 1/2c to 1c, December 16, 1941, May 1942; soybeans unchanged on the December deliver, 1/2c up on the deferred and lard unchanged to 2 1/2 cents a hundred pounds higher.

Tommervik Named on Little All-America

Hawaiian on Squad for First Time; Harshman on Second Team. By HERB BARKER. NEW YORK, Dec. 16 (AP)—The annual little all-America football team, compiled by the Associated Press today features the selection of a player from the University of Hawaii for the first time in its eight-year history.

The Hawaiian is Nolle Smith, 21-year-old halfback of Indian-Irish descent, who was the spark plug of this year's able University of Hawaii team which more than held its own against small-college teams of the mainland. Smith's backfield mates on the little all-America include Marvin Tommervik, great offensive star of Pacific Lutheran College of Parkland, Wash.; Jimmy (Casey) Jones of Union University at Jackson, Tenn.; and Jackie Hunt, great all-around star of Marshall college in Huntington, W. Va.

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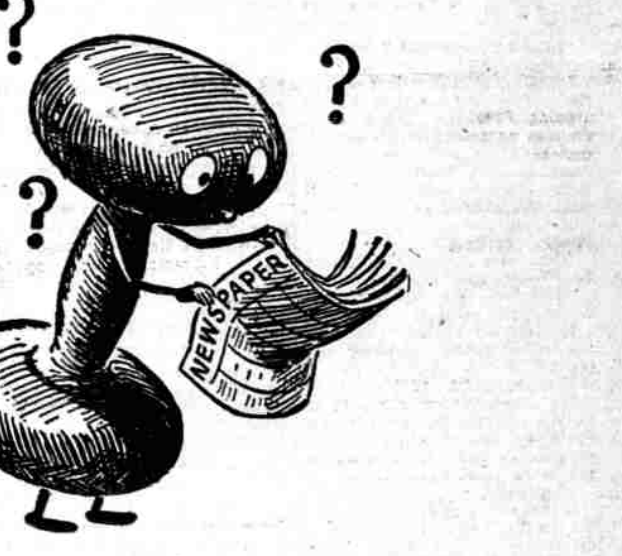
