The men who collect the news for the newspapers and radio stations of the United States are patriotic citizens who can be depended upon to avoid mistakes that will be helpful to the enemy. If there are exceptions, they will be discovered by their employers and eliminated. will be possible, therefore, to permit a considerable reedom, appropriate to a democratic nation, with the rules carefully worked out and understood by all. When question of propriety of news is involved, a check must e made by an authority that can be easily reached.

Heartening this week was the blunt, straightforward tory of Pearl Harbor given out by Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox. It satisfied the American people, who were beginning to grumble about an apparent attempt to make a secret of that whole situation. In admitting mistakes, it gave the public a feeling the mistakes would be investi-tated and not permitted to happen again. That is what e want.




