Approximately 20 people will have filed petitions for final naturalization papers here by the end of the hearing now in progress at the county courthouse, according to Victor S. Hemmen, naturalization official. The next hearing is tentatively set for March 5.

Naturalization has been suspended on all persons belonging to an enemy alien race, according to instructions received last week from Washington. This does not mean, however, that all proceedings must be stopped. Papers may be completed by these persons, up to the swearing in by the judge, Hemmen said.

Machinery is now being set in motion, he announced for taking care of the naturalization of enemy aliens whose record is obviously clear.
