Starting next Monday, Decem-ber 22, anyone in the vicinity of Klamath Falls who wishes the convenience of a checking account may open one at the Klamath Falls branch of the First National Bank of Portland under CheckMaster Plan with an initial deposit of as little as one dollar, it is announced by Mit-chell Tillotson, branch manager.

No minimum balance will be required at any time, and there will be no monthly carrying charge regardless of how small the depositor's balance. Checkbooks are free, with no advance payments of any kind. Only five cents is charged for each check drawn and each item deposited, he said in telling of the Check-Master department as an addi-tion to the bank's existing checking account facilities.

"The CheckMaster plan," Mr. Tillotson pointed out, "is nationally famous as 'the checking acand is now being used by hund-reds of thousands of depositors in other sections of the country It is known as the original sys tem that made checking facili-ties available without requiring a minimum balance. The bank's only requirement is that the de positor's balance be sufficient to cover the checks he draws."

Checkbooks are issued free to

depositors without any restric-tions as to the number of checks that may be issued, and are ex-actly the same as those used in commercial department of the bank.

Flares were seen in the sky, apparently dropped by enemy aircraft. The "All Clear" signal was given when the planes disappeared.
