

UNION ANGRY ABOUT LIGHT BILL MATTER

The Klamath district council of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers union (AFL) was revealed Thursday to have passed a resolution siding the union with a committee now working to obtain Bonneville power for the Klamath basin.

The move was said by M. T. Pavolka of the union to be an outgrowth of a squabble which arose between the union and the California Oregon Power company over the payment of striking employes' bills in Weed, Calif., at the time of the recent Long-Bell Lumber company shutdown.

According to Pavolka and Wilbur Yeoman, another LSW representative, the union believed that Copco's efforts to collect some 40 accounts were premature and not in line with usual Copco policy. They said the union took the view that the power company was making unduly early ultimatums in threatening to cut power facilities if the bills were not paid.

The bills were paid by the LSW, they said, but under protest.

H. P. Bosworth, manager of the Klamath Copco office, said that the matter was handled through the Yreka power company headquarters and the Medford billing office but that in his understanding of the situation, regular power company policy was followed in the Weed cases.

He said that in all the 40 instances payment of the accounts was 30 days in arrears, at which time routine company policy demands a power shutdown unless illness or other irremediable reasons are the cause of non-payment.

He outlined the company procedure as follows: A meter reading is made, for example, on November 1 covering the power service for the past 30 days. A billing is made

and received by users five to seven days after the reading. If a remittance is not made in 15 days a decision is made to make a personal contact. Three days after the decision is still not made, if the account is not settled notification of a power shutdown is made.

Bosworth said that as far as he knew the same policy was followed without partisanship in the Weed cases.

The union asserted that it believed Copco was discriminating against the Long-Bell strikers. The council appointed a committee composed of Kenneth Gordon, Klamath Falls; Ed Brandenberg, Lakeview; George Horn, Algoma, and Yeoman to work with the Bonneville group.

Three American Tugs Unreported In Pacific Zone

SEATTLE, Dec. 18 (AP)—Twenty-three Seattle and Tacoma men aboard three Puget sound tugs are unreported in the Pacific war zone since beginning of hostilities with Japan.

Skippers of the three boats are Capt. Oscar Rolstad, Tacoma; Capt. Ray Hall, Seattle, and Capt. Thomas Innes, Seattle. Listed as aboard one of the boats is Drew Foss, son of Capt. Henry Foss, secretary of the Foss Launch and Tug company, owner of the vessels.

All were equipped with wireless and may have received warning of the Japanese attack in time to seek safe refuge, it was pointed out.

The thirteenth naval district headquarters authorized publication of the report without mention of the areas in which the tugs had been stationed.
