According to Pavolka and Wilbur Yeoman, another LSW representative, the union believed that Copco's efforts to collect some 40 accounts were premature and not in line with usual Copco policy. They said the union took the view that the power company was making unduly early ultimatums in threatto cut power facilities if the bills were not paid.
