Covers were laid for ten around a prettily arranged centerpiece of Christmas greens and candles.

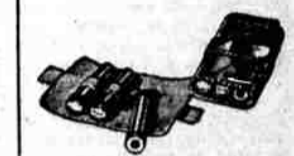
