

PLANS FOR PEACE OUTLINED BY POPE

VATICAN CITY, Dec. 24 — (Official Broadcast Recorded by AP)—Pope Pius XII, in his annual Christmas eve message to the world, laid down a five-point plan for future world peace, predicated upon "an adequate and progressive" limitation of armaments.

The pontiff, broadcasting over the Vatican radio, said that in the world of the future there must be no place for:

- 1—Any kind of aggression.
- 2—Oppression of minorities.
- 3—Designating nations seeking a monopoly on economic wealth.
- 4—Total war or armaments races.
- 5—Persecution directed against religious sects or churches because of faith "is one of the rights of mankind."

"There must be a progressive limitation of armaments," he said. "True respect for treaties must be observed."

STRICT HOLIDAY VIGIL ORDERED

SEATTLE, Dec. 24 (AP) — A strict holiday vigil has been ordered for interceptor units operating in the Pacific northwest in view of the fact "Christmas and New Year's eve are deeply significant holidays not observed by some of our enemies."

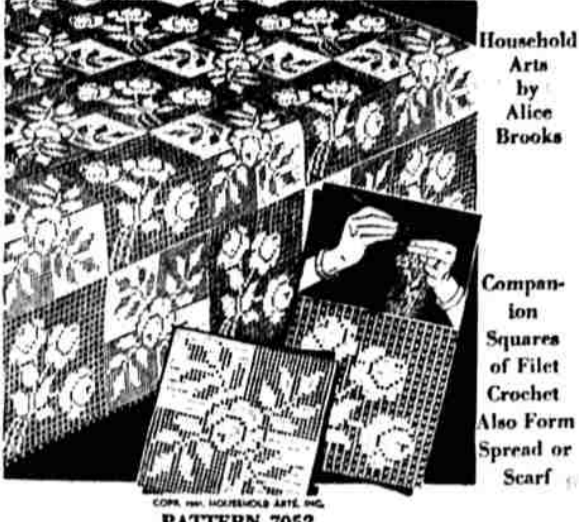
The order, issued by the second interceptor command, advised:

MAROONED FLIERS HIKE TOWARD AID

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Dec. 24 (AP)—An Alaskan pilot and his two passengers who have spent six days and nights on the shores of a frozen lake awaiting rescue started a hike through bitter cold country today to a lake 10 miles distant where they hope to meet the men who were unable to reach them at their previous location.

The trio, Pilot Archie Ferguson, Dr. David Hoehn and Norman Anthony, were forced down last Thursday when ice formed on the wings of their plane. Landing on a tiny lake just inside the Arctic circle, they established communication with the outer world long enough to give their location before their radio went dead.

Subsequent attempts to rescue them have failed as it has been found impossible to land rescue planes on the small lake so they were directed by Pilots John Cross and Don Emmons to head for a larger lake ten miles distant.

There the rescue planes will await the trio and bring them to Fairbanks.

Transportation News

NEW HIGHS REACHED IN FREIGHT SERVICE

While the railroads will not this year establish new highs in the amount of passenger service performed, as is true with reformed, the passenger record this year will more closely approach the 1929 level than in any other subsequent year, according to the western railways committee.

Passenger service performed in 1929, measured in passengers transported one mile, however, was approximately 34 per cent less than in 1921, there having been a progressive decline through the '20's," with further decline during depression years.

Freight service performed in 1929, however, was much greater than in 1921. Experience thus far this year indicates that the passenger total for 1941 will be at least 90 per cent as great as in 1929, though, and that it will be more than 35 per cent greater than the low in 1933.

Railways Operating 75,000 Miles Per

American railways now are operating 75,000 miles of mile-a-minute, or better, passenger service daily, according to the western railways committee.

There has been an increase in such daily service from 63,000

miles in 1940, and from 55,000 miles in 1939.

Thirty-four new, lightweight, streamlined trains have been put in service in the last year, bringing the total of such trains in service to 121. Twenty-six additional trains of the streamlined, lightweight type now are being built. Completion of these trains may be somewhat delayed, however, due to priority policies regulating distribution and delivery of materials during the defense emergency.

GP Woman Gets Happy News Her Son Not Killed

GRANTS PASS, Dec. 24 (AP) Happy Christmas news for Mrs. Lulu J. Wright of Grants Pass took the form of word from Salem that her son, Sgt. John A. Wright, marine corps recruiter, was there and alive.

She had received a telegram from the navy Sunday night: "Deeply regret to inform you that your son, Sergeant John A. Wright, U. S. marine corps, was killed in action in the performance of his duty in the service of his country."

The Associated Press reported Tuesday that Wright was still at his post in Salem, and very much alive.

GRANTS PASS, Dec. 24 (AP)—"I'm happy that my son is alive, but someone else is dead," said Mrs. Lulu Griffith today as she wiped away tears that persisted even after a correction of the false report that her son had been killed in military action.
