

ICC Upholds Lumber Shipping Rate Increase

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (F)-The Interstate Commerce Com-mission ruled today that an in-crease of 50 cents a 1000 feet in rates on lumber shipments by water between ports in Oregon and Washington and ports in California was "not unreasonable or otherwise unlawful."

The increased rates became effective last June 11 but the ICC

continued an investigation into their reasonableness.

The office of price administra-tion and civillan supply opposed the higher rates the higher rates, contending they were unreasonable and would result in inflationary price levels on lumber and would adversely affect national defense activities.

The commission said, however, that the increased freight rates represented only a relatively small part of the delivered price of lumber shipped from ports in Oregon and Washington and therefore would not result in an inflationary price.
