LOS ANGELES, Jan. 3 (UP)-Repatriation of indigent Mexican nationals has been approved by President Manuel Avila Camacho of Mexico, the Los Angeles county board of supervisors was informed today.

Supervisor John Anson Ford telegraphed fellow members of the board from Mexico City that he conferred with President Camacho and received approval

of the plan.

Ford said in his message that the Mexican president had or-dered Miguel Aleman, secretary of interior, and Ezequiel Padilla, secretary of foreign affairs, to attend future conferences on the repatriation plan in Los Angeles which will be presided over by Mexican Consul Rodolfo Sala-

The supervisor said President Camacho suggested that certain industrial areas of Lower California would be acceptable ab sorption points for the repatri-ated Mexican citizens.

Persons returning to their homeland would do so voluntarily and would receive an as yet undetermined sum of money from the county government to help them establish themselves on their native soil.

180,000 KILLED IN

NEW YORK, Jan. 3 (UP)-More than 180,000 persons have been slaughtered in the nazi puppet state of Croatia, part of former Jugoslavia, the Jugoslav legation in London has learned. yesterday London radio said in a broadcast heard by the United Press listening post here.
