

FOOD GOAL TO BE BOOSTED BY DEPARTMENT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6 (AP)—The agriculture department is boosting the country's record-breaking 1942 food production goals so that the United States can, if necessary, become the veritable bread-basket as well as the arsenal of the anti-axis nations.

The stepped-up goals may be announced later this week. The department is anxious to get them on record as quickly as possible so that they can be apportioned among farmers in time for them to make the necessary adjustments in their plans.

Japanese successes in the Pacific coupled with official predictions that the war may be prolonged have led Secretary Wickard and his crop control experts to review the tentative current goals for such products as corn, oats, barley, soybeans, livestock, vegetable crops and dairy products.

These goals were established early in the fall, before the United States became involved in the war. While calling for the largest production in the history of American agriculture, the program was based upon the expectation that only Great Britain would be needing substantial quantities of food produced in this country.

Officials said that with Russia and China throwing greater and greater portions of their manpower into this war, this country may have to supply both with considerable quantities of food.

Farm officials no longer are concerned about surpluses. They take the view that in a war such as is being waged now, there cannot be too much food and fiber supplies. They point out that present governmental power to place floors under grower prices make it possible for farmers to produce abundantly without suffering price drops.

'U. S. FLAG TO FLY IN CAVITE AGAIN', CLAIM

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6 (UP)—The map who raised the first American flag over Cavite believes it soon will be flying there again.

Brig. Gen. Dion Williams, marine corps, retired, on May 3, 1898, under orders from Commodore George Dewey, led a detachment of marines from the USS Baltimore to take over the Spanish arsenal and town at Cavite after the battle of Manila Bay.

Commenting on the American evacuation of Cavite, Williams said:

"The flag we raised at Cavite will fly again. We put it up once. We'll do it again."

A first lieutenant at the time of the Spanish-American war, Williams served through the Philippine insurrections, then in China, Cuba, Santo Domingo and Panama. He was fleet marine officer when President Theodore Roosevelt sent the U. S. fleet around the world.

Williams was born in Willisburgh, O., Dec. 15, 1869. He lives in Washington.

Man Given Twelve Months, \$100 Fine For Theft of Tire

RICHMOND, Va., Jan. 6 (AP)—A man charged with stealing a used tire was given the maximum penalty for petty larceny of 12 months and \$100 fine here Monday.

Wages Increased 10 Per Cent for County Road Work

It was explained that the increases were "made to compete with private and defense industries in the matter of pay."

'KILL A RUMOR' IS NAVY'S WARNING

Thirteenth district naval authorities today reiterated the president's warning against rumors and urged all civilians to "kill a rumor by refusing to carry it further."

"The regular news agencies are carrying all legitimate navy news which will not be of aid to the enemy," the spokesman said. "Meanwhile hundreds of street rumors are being circulated, some by enemy agents—in an effort to create panic and confusion—but most by unthinking citizens who do not realize they are aiding the enemy by retelling idle gossip."

Along with the rumors, the navy officials pointed out, there are occasional facts which generate from defense plants, waterfronts, and even naval stations, which if given wide oral circulation are of genuine assistance to the axis powers.

PEP PEPPERS START HOOP TICKET SALES
