

**AUTO TAXING STAMPS NOT YET ON SALE**

Stamps have not yet arrived at the local postoffice for use in collecting the new federal use tax on automobiles, Postmaster Burt E. Hawkins, said Friday.

According to word from the state automobile association, plans for collecting the tax have been revised to put the job in the laps of the postoffices of all classes.

First payment of \$2.00 is due February 1 and will cover the months through June, 1942. On or before July, 1942, it will be necessary to purchase a second \$2 stamp in payment of the tax for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Motor vehicle owners are expected to go to their local postoffice or substation and purchase the revenue stamp, which will constitute payment of the use tax. They must fill out a form with information concerning each vehicle—motor number, serial number, description, and the stamp must be displayed on the vehicle.

Violations are punishable by a fine of "not more than \$25 or imprisonment for not more than 30 days, or both." Arrests may be made by any federal officer. Postmaster Hawkins said that announcement will be made when the stamps arrive here, but he added he has received no instructions as to collection of the tax as yet.

**Bakery Workers Given Back Pay For Overtime**

Restitution totaling \$508.51 has been made to approximately 17 employees of Beck's bakery, Klamath Falls, representing the difference between wages and overtime pay received and what they were entitled to under the fair labor standards act, it was announced today by Charles H. Elrey, branch manager of the wage and hour division, U. S. department of labor, at the branch office of the division in room 208 U. S. courthouse, Portland.

In announcing the payment Elrey pointed out that Beck's bakery made restitution without the necessity of court action. This policy has been approved by the administrator of the wage and hour division in cases where investigation discloses that employers did not intentionally or willfully violate the law and where no aggravated circumstances of any kind are present.

**Four More Red Cross First Aid Classes to Start**

Announcement was made from Red Cross headquarters Friday that four classes in standard first aid had been scheduled to begin within the next week. These classes are open to both men and women.

The first class will be held in the armory building at Red Cross headquarters on Monday, January 12, at 7:30 p. m. under Colonel Napier, instructor. The second and third classes will be held in Fremont school on January 13 at 7:30 p. m. Miss Eva Burkhalter and Miss Irene Redetzke, instructors.

The fourth class will be held in the armory at Red Cross headquarters on Tuesday, January 20, at 7:30 p. m. Mrs. Vesta Spatz will instruct. All instructors have been authorized by the American National Red Cross to instruct both standard and advanced classes.

**20 PILOTS SIGNED FOR CIVIL DEFENSE**

About 20 Klamath pilots have signed up for civil air patrol work as organized under the United States offices of civilian defense.

Purpose of the CAP is to bring civilian aviation into the total effort of the United States to win the war, according to information received by Max Guiley, head of the Klamath Air service.

It is expected a nationwide training service will be established for both flight and ground work. Insignia is being patented and uniforms designed for members of the CAP.

A final outline of the work to be done by the CAP has not been announced, but a government booklet lists many functions that might be possible, such as courier service, back-country observation patrol,

guarding airports, towing of aerial gunnery targets, assistance to air raid watchers, and so on.

**Gestapo Refugee Unable to Speak Here as Scheduled**

H. S. Hathe, of the local Sons of Norway, received a telegram Friday morning from H. Ragnar Olsen, district secretary of the organization at Seattle, advising him that Ivan Jacobsen, who was to have spoken on German concentration camps at the KUHS auditorium Sunday evening will be unable to fill his engagement.

The telegram reads: "Please advise your committee that Jacobsen is cancelling all engagements. He has been ordered to California by the Norwegian legation to take up special work there. Sorry."

Proceeds from the Jacobsen lecture were to have been used to supplement the funds for Little Norway, the Norwegian air force training camp at Toronto, Canada.

**REGISTRATION OF HORSES CONTINUED**

The final date for voluntary registration of horses and mules has been changed from January 10 to January 20. The 10 additional days have been allowed to permit a more thorough census.

This voluntary registration was requested recently by the headquarters, Western Remount Area, San Mateo, California, to enable that army agency to determine accurately the current resources of military horses and mules in the states of California, Oregon, Washington and Nevada, as well as the location and ownership of such animals, so that if and when needed they may be quickly purchased and assembled for military use.

Horse and mule owners are requested to report by card or letter—no special form is necessary—to their county agents the age, sex, color, whether riding or draft type, whether broken or

unbroken and whether or not necessary for owner's use, of each horse or mule between the age of three and ten inclusive. In counties not having county agents or farm advisors, the information may be reported directly to the Western Remount Area, 72-3rd Avenue, San Mateo, California.

Registration or listing of potential military animals is voluntary on the part of the owner. Such listing implies no later obligation by the owner to sell to the army nor the army to buy. How many horses or mules the army will need in the future cannot yet be determined. However, curtailment of production in various fields, restrictions on use of certain essentials and other conditions both foreign and domestic seem to indicate that greater reliance must be placed on horse power in the immediate future, both by the military and those in civilian pursuits. Military needs of the most urgent sort frequently arise overnight.

The remount service must be prepared to meet any military requirements for horses and mules and this registration or

recensus of potential military animals will be of great assistance in preparing to meet such requirements.

**Passenger Trains Run Behind Time Through Klamath**

Southern Pacific passenger train service continued to run from one to two hours behind schedule Friday due to routing problems.

The northbound train, due at 10:50 Friday morning, arrived at 11:10; the southbound schedule, due at 7 a. m., arrived at 8:15; and the southbound 8:10 train arrived at 10:30.
