# STAMPS NOT YET ON SALE

Stamps have not yet arrived at the local postoffice for use in collecting the new federal use tax on automobiles, Postmaster Burt E. Hawkins said Friday.

According to word from the state automobile association, plans for collecting the tax have been revised to put the job in the laps of the postoffices of

First payment of \$2.09 is due February 1 and will cover the months through June, 1942. On or before July, 1942, it will be ecessary to purchase a second for the fiscal year beginning

Motor vehicle owners are ex pected to go to their local post office or substation and pur-chase the revenue stamp, which will constitute payment of the use tax. They must fill out a form with information concerning each vehicle-motor num-ber, serial number, description. and the stamp must be displayed on the vehicle.

Violations are punishable by fine of "not more than \$25 or imprisonment for not more than 30 days, or both." Arrests may be made by any federal officer.

Postmaster Hawkins said that announcement will be made when the stamps arrive here, but he added he has received Instructions as to collection the tax as yet.

This policy has been approved by the administrator of the wage and hour division in cases where investigation discloses that employers did not inten-tionally or wilfully violate the law and where no aggravated circumstances of any kind are present.
